

The aim of the college is to impart quality education taking into consideration the social ,economic ,political and administrative challenges. The story of the progress of the college is characterized by ruthless striving and sleepless determination to overcome all obstacles that reared their ugly hideous heads on its journey to excellence. The road was rough; the terrain tough but there was no dearth of zeal and enthusiasm. Everyone had a dream which was to make the college reach the heights of excellence, inclusiveness and sincerity in its service to the community.



PRINCIPAL'S DESK

Only students who were enrolled for the BA pass course. The college ,being adjacent to the Jessore Road and not far from the Madhyamgram Municipality seemed to be a boon for the inhabitants of the area as there was no college in the vicinity and gaining admission in elite colleges was indeed tough for students hailing from semi urban and rural background. The simple people of our locality needed an institution where they could send their wards to seek

true education without the trammels of opulence weighing them down ,a college where teaching was honest and above all bereft of the ostentation of arrogant arid scholarship. These men were poor but they had abundant reserves of determination ,strength of mind and shared a singleness of purpose , qualities without which the foundations of such an enduring edifice might not have been possible.

In 2002, Dr. Chandan Kumar Chakraborty joined the college as principal and the narrative of the college after this period is one of hope, ambition and development. Within months of his assumption of office honours courses in Bengali, Education, Geography, History and English etc, were introduced. Since 2002 the college has been definitely growing in stature. The layout of the present building with augmented space in the library ,canteen ,hostel for women ,new classrooms boundary wall, Seminar cum conference room, cycle garage, deep tube well, three Generators, Smart Class rooms, fire extinguisher, CCTV, increasing books at Library, Gymnasium for Ladies, Opening P.G courses from DDE, Vidyasagar University and Rabindra Bharati University, 35 Computers, 4 Laptops, 22 A.C. Machines, three Projectors, one Total station, five cold water Machines, Women's Hostel, Purchase 3bighas of Land for 2nd Campus, 4-storied new construction started, Solar Light system, Rain water Harvesting, Medicinal Plantation, Concrete Path way, Beautiful small play ground, are all parts of the success story. The college under his stewardship is one of the few colleges with a large proportion of minority community students .The college boasts of 54% minority female students most of whom have produced wonderful results at the undergraduate level and have also in some instances excelled in university examinations at the post graduate level .The active intervention of the college administration has ensured that minority students receive financial assistance from the UGC ,Govt of West Bengal and also at the college level . Steps were taken towards the beautification of the campus, provisions for enabling students to reap the benefits of the digital era were made and new classrooms were constructed. As a direct corollary there was a marked increase in student strength and there are SC/ ST and OBC A and B and Minority students on its rolls. Special classes are held and tutorial level guidance is provided for the academically deficient .There is also the provision of arranging stipends for all students irrespective of their backgrounds .There is the scheme of Remedial Coaching Classes and the Entry - in -Service Scheme has instilled confidence in students to explore the job market.

In conclusion, it should be mentioned that the teaching faculties, non teaching Staff and also students are actively involved to prepare the Self Study Report. Our institution undergoes the accreditation process for the first time that is Cycle-1 and we are ready for the NAAC assessment. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Criteria -I: CURRICULAR ASPECTS

- 1. The vision and mission of the institution reflect to raise the institution to a very high standard in respect of teaching, learning, result, administration and academic atmosphere in the college.
- **2.** Beginning of the academic session, the College publishes a master routine so that it enables a teacher to complete the curriculum prescribed by the University within a stipulated period.
- **3.** The massive renovation of the College infrastructure as well as the up gradation of the Library, Geography equipments and well furnished A.C. Lab facilities, A.C. smart class rooms, Education Lab facilities are introduced.
- 4. Several faculty members have made significant contributions in the present and past for the development of the college.
- 5. Ensuring quality of performance at Tutorials, Remedial Coaching and UGC Entry-in-Service. Encouraging the students for research purposes and to do the social work.
- 6. The College offers three years B.A. Honours courses in 4 subjects viz, Bengali, English, History and Education. Three year General courses are taught in the subjects like English, Bengali, History, Education, Geography, Political-Science and Philosophy. The college also offers three years B.Sc Hons course in Geography
- 7. For the undergraduate programme the institution follows the curriculum set by the affiliating University i.e. West Bengal State University.
- 8. Excursion and field survey are the essential parts of the curriculum of the departments like Geography and Education. Most of all the departments arranged such excursions and field survey with active support from the College.
- 9. The use of ICT for the teaching learning process encouraged by the college.
- 10. Further, the College authority signed a MOU with Orion Edutech Private Ltd. on 11th day of March 2015 for introducing the skill development courses viz, i) B-VOC in Apparel Manufacturing & Designing, ii) B-VOC in Cloud & Mobile Software Engineering & iii) Diploma in Hardware & Networking Courses.
- 11. Feedback forms are collected. Parent and Teacher meetings are held and the discussion making body keeps itself abreast of all resolutions.

Criteria -II: TEACHING LEARNING AND EVALUATION

- 1. The website of the college which caters exclusively to the admission process is fully functional. The college website provides all information regarding admission.
- 2. In strict adherence to West Bengal Government rules, all the admission process is conducted online. Applications were made online and candidates deposited college fees through challan generated by the Bank.
- **3.** The college follows the reservation policy of the State Government and adheres to the directives of the University in this regard.
- 4. There are 54% minority female students and this reflects our commitment to make education inclusive and all encompassing. Concession and financial benefits are provided to minority students. Courses under the auspices of the UGC have been introduced in this regard.
- 5. The office work of Remedial Coaching at Vivekananda College, Madhyamgram, North 24 Parganas, Kolkata-700129 for admission to attend the Remedial Coaching was arranged on and from 1st August, 2010 to 30th September, 2012. The classes are organized on and from 4th September, 2010 to 30th September 2012 and from 1st October 2013 to 30th September 2014. The total no of students i.e. 409 (four hundred nine) were benefited through this above said coaching classes.
- 6. The office work of Coaching for Entry-in-Services in Colleges at Vivekananda College, Madhyamgram, North 24 Parganas, Kolkata 700129 for admission to attend the Entry in service in Colleges was arranged on and from 1st August, 2010. The classes were organized on and from 23.09.2010 to 21.11.2010 and 1.06.2013 to 30.06.2014. The total no of students i.e. 22(Twenty two) were benefited through this above said coaching classes.
- 7. The College admits visually challenged and physically able students in certain Departments. These students are given extra care and attention by the course teachers to enable them to learn and perform better.
- 8. The College has constituted the Internal Complaints Committee (ICC) in compliance with the Prevention of Sexual Harassment Act of 2013. The task of raising awareness in this regard is cast upon this very competent committee.
- 9. It is an institutional policy to impart quality education, even to the less privileged sections of society. The location of the College, the courses offered and the overall atmosphere serve to attract large number of students from the minority (Muslim)

- community, many of whom are first generation learners. The growing number of students from the minority community indicates the positive approach and efforts made by the institution towards inclusion.
- 10. To maintain the parity with the national commitment for inclusion of the socially weaker section of the society, along with the advantage of reservation, stipends and scholarships sponsored by the State Government and UGC are awarded to the students of SC/ST and OBC categories.
- 11. Kanyashree Scholarships offered by the State Government to the deserving girl students have been introduced from the last academic year.
- 12. Academic calendar-2013-14, 2014-15 and 2015-16 after publication of Academic Calendar by the affiliating University, the college prepares its academic calendar following the broad outline of the University. Special care is taken to ensure that the academic calendar of the college contains details of every aspect of the college especially tentative dates of commencement of classes, class test dates, schedules of selection test etc.
- 13. Despite the fact that the IQAC is a post accreditation body, the achieve initiative by the Principal of the college and enthusiasm generated by his actions in this regard, on the recommendation of the Governing Body of the college, the IQAC of the college was formed on 26.07.2013.
- 14. The library of the college to which students have ready accepted 10,435 books and journals. Apart from this the library is centrally air conditioned with a reading room under CCTV coverage. Students are encouraged to make regular visit to the library.
- 15. Students are encouraged to contribute their articles in various journals; the college magazine etc. students of same Departments also bring out wall magazines. The college magazine "college scope" contains articles mainly by our leavers in which their creative and critical articles are evident.
- 16. The faculty uses computers, multimedia projectors for power point presentation.

 Computer software packages are used in certain subjects like Geography
- 17. Several departments hold class tests regularly for proper assessment of the students. Beside class test, the College authority organized annual test examination.
- 18. Skill development is a major aspect of the holistic education college imparts to students. In line with this vision, computer literacy, increasing competency levels in spoken and written English are emphasized. Assignments and presentation of their

work in an interactive manner by incorporating pictures, images, slides, audio and video materials in presentations is encouraged.

Criteria –III: RESEARCH CONSULTANCY AND EXTENSION

- 1. The college provides ample space, infrastructural support, experimental garden, 24hours uninterrupted water supply, books, journals from the library and 24 hours power back up.
- 2. As soon as the research grant is received by the college from the UGC or any other funding agencies, it is immediately released by the authority, as per norms.
- 3. The students have ample opportunities to consult with the faculty members regarding research oriented work. In practical based subjects (Geography & Education) have scope to do project work based on field work. The students of 3rd year Honours Students have to prepare the project reports in several subjects.
- 4. The several departments organize seminars, lectures, competitions with or without collaborations with various organizations.
- 5. Departmental seminars are organized severally. A special lecture was delivered by eminent person on "Population Studies" in the Department of Geography. Another special lecture was delivered by the resource person "Graphical representation of data: A brief discussion" in the Department of Education.
- 6. Department of Geography and Education organized regular basis excursion tours in rural and urban areas to stimulation research interest among the students.14 computers with two licensed software and one open source software in the laboratory with full Wi-Fi connections are preserved for project purposes.
- 7. Various programmes are organized by the NSS Unit such as Blood donation camp, Health check up camp, Youth day, Women's day, Yoga camp etc.

Criteria –IV: INFRASTUCTURE AND LEARNING RESOURCES

- 1. Classrooms, technology enabled learning spaces, Seminar cum-conference hall along with smart class, tutorial spaces, laboratories, botanical garden, animal house, specialized facilities and equipments for teaching, learning and research etc.
- 2. Almost all the departments of the College are having spacious classrooms and seminar rooms with regular access of the students.

- 3. Other than the Seminar rooms at departments, there is an audio-visually well-equipped Seminar room with the seating capacity of more than 175. The room known as 'Vivekananda Hall' for Seminar Cum-conference and smart class room. Contains permanent audio-visual facilities and is air-conditioned.
- 4. There is one medicinal plant garden named, 'Ramakrishna Shasthya Niramoy Udyan' and a small botanical garden with rare species of plants maintained by the College.
- **5.** For effective teaching, learning the Geography and Education departments are provided LCD Projector. In addition to the same there are two smart class rooms which are made available to the teachers as and when necessary.
- **6.** The College has build up a Women's Hostel under financial assistance of UGC. The Hostel is completed in 2015.
- 7. The College provides safe drinking water facilities for the students and the staff by installing water purifiers in several places. We have five Blue Star water cooler machines for the students.
- 8. College is providing the Students access to N-LIST where student can access the full text of 1lakh + e- books and 6000 + e-journals free of cost. To facilitate and motivate the students for using the E-LIBRARY facility. Library has an exclusive E-LIBRARY browsing centre comprising 4-computers with high speed Internet facility.
- 9. Number of computers with configuration (provide actual number with exact configuration of each available system): 39 (1 8GB RAM, 10 with 2GH/processor, 1GB RAM. 10 with 2GH/Processor 1GB RAM, 18 with 2GH/Processor).

Criteria -V: STUDENT SUPPORT AND PROGRESSION

- **1.** The College authority arranged various scholarships/free-ships/stipend for the SC/ST/OBC/Minorities/Bidi labour stipend/Chief Minister Welfare fund/Mohasin fund and financially week students.
- **2.** From the financial year 2015-2016, the financial assistance from the West Bengal Govt. to the students (e.g. Minority stipend and merit scholarship) directly goes to the student's individual bank account.
- 3. The college also has a students' Aid Fund in order to extend financial help to the economically backward students.

- 4. The college has constructed ramps at the entry point of college main building for physically challenged persons.
- **5.** The teachers of the college take special care by attending remedial classes for the improvement of the slow learners.
- 6. Organize Annual sports and inter class tournaments (Football, Cricket, Badminton, Volleyball, Chess, Carom etc) followed by a colourful prize distribution ceremony.
- 7. Women's Cell takes care for the female students of the College and tries to settle any trivial problem faced by them. The Cell also takes initiative to augment the awareness of the girls' students.
- 8. Soumyadeep Roy, a student of our College, a famous Table Tennis player who represented India at International level in several time.
- Beside, the college has Anti Raging Cell, Grievance Red Ressal Cell and Women's Cell.

Criteria -VI: GOVERNANCE. LEADERSHIP AND MANAGEMENT

- The College has a Governing Body, a Teachers council, an Academic Sub-committee, an IQAC team, a Finance Committee, Women's Cell, Purchase committee, Building Committee, Library Committee etc. All these bodies are actively supportive about the functioning well of the College.
- 2. The Governing Body (G.B.) of the College is the supreme decision making body and the Principal as the Secretary of the G.B., implements the decisions. The Principal as per statutory power executes all the rules and regulations of the College as per Statue of the West Bengal State University.
- 3. Teachers are invited as Guest Faculty of West Bengal State University and the college authority gives the permission to that particular faculties.
- **4.** The major sources of institutional funding are from the students fees, grants from West Bengal Govt., UGC grants etc. The College also receives occasional grants from MPLAD fund, Zilla Parishad fund etc.

Criteria -VI: INNOVATION AND BEST PRACTICES

- The College has an Environmental Society. The environmental society and NSS always involved to clean our College campus as well as regular plantation programme is going on.
- **2.** The College organized Seminars on Environmental aspect to grow up the awareness of the students. The College prepared the Environmental Green Audit.
- 3. A new two storied building with 10 numbers of rooms was built for Women's Hostel and ready for accommodation through advertisement on Daily news paper. The total area of this building is 326.585 Sq. meter and the capacity of accommodation is 38.
- 4. Nabin Chandra High School, Kirtipur has donated three Bighas of land for constructing the second campus of our college. The registration of land has completed where the plan and estimate is prepared by PW (Dte), Government of West Bengal.
- 5. The College aims to improve efficiency of the administrative staff by introducing administrative empowerment.

- 31. Installed three Generators viz, one 35 KV, one 25 KV and another is 6 KV.
- 32. Teachers' exchange programme is regularly going on.
- 33. Published the College Magazine and Prospectus.
- 34. Women's' Hostel is completed by the UGCs' financial assistance.
- 35. Renovating the entire College building including ladies' toilet and Gents' toilets.
- 36. Installed 18 Fire Extinguishers to protect the College from fire issues (accidents).
- 37. Deposited amounting to Rs. 75 lac for constructing the new 4-storied building at PWD office, Barasat, North 24 Parganas, the PWD is arranging the soil testing in the college campus.
- 38. Going to register 3 (three) Bighas of land for second campus at Kirtipur, North 24 Parganas.

WEAKNESS:

- We are very much aware of our weakness, which are many. In true sense, weakness
 is the main instrument to inspire us for avoiding the problematic situation and
 overcome it for re-building of our College excellent in future through honest approach
 and sacrifice.
- 2. We are, financially, a poor institution; we have required more class rooms, gymnasium room, and big play ground, lack of permanent teaching and non-teaching staffs and permanent librarian. We cannot fulfill our aim for the lack of assistance of money from various sources and we are not able to create the new teaching and non-teaching posts and permanent librarian post though we applied to the Higher Education Department. Beside that the five substantive teaching posts are lying vacant and three permanent Non-teaching posts are also lying vacant. It is very painful to us for not being able to fill-up the above said vacant teaching, Non-teaching posts. We applied for creating teaching, non-teaching and librarian posts for the academic interest of the students to the Higher Education Department, West Bengal, unfortunately we do not get the approval against any new post.
- 3. We need additional facilities z, Class rooms, Store room, beautiful cafeteria, ladies' common room, student's common room, computerized office, and staffs with computer knowledge, auditorium, and second campus for scarcity of land etc.
- 4. To open the general Science Stream but it is not possible for financial crisis; we want to open regular course of M.Sc in Geography, Journalism and Mass communication in UG level.

OPPORTUNITIES:

- 1. Being only College in the locality under the jurisdiction of Madhyamgram Municipality, it can avail itself of the opportunity of having a huge number of girls' minority students, SC/ST, OBC-A & OBC-B bright students.
- 2. Availability of a large number of subjects including unconventional and emerging subjects.
- 3. Location of the College in a place with convenient connectivity.

- 4. The College has the opportunity scope of further extension in the 2nd campus,
- 5. Very effective and co-operative Students' Union.
- 6. Location of Police Station, Post office, Bank, Railway station, Municipality office and Fire Brigade office in close proximity of the College.

Departmental Seminar rooms, opening the B.Ed course and D. Ed course at 2nd campus Kirtipur, North 24 Parganas.

A TIME LINE:

1986-1990

Vivekananda College was established under the Jurisdiction of Calcutta University in 1986 vide Calcutta University affiliation letter No. C/1057/252 Affl. Dated 20.10.1986. Sri Saral Deb, Founder President of the Governing Body and also the Minister-in-Charge, Cooperative Department, Govt. of West Bengal was taken an initiative to establish the Vivekananda College, Village + P.O.— East Udayrajpur, Madhyamgram, North 24 Parganas. At the early stage, the Higher Education Department, Govt. of West Bengal sanctioned five subjects viz., Bengali, English, History, Political Science and Philosophy for Pass Level. Beside that the Higher Education Department also sanctioned one Principal Post, five substantive teaching posts and ten Non-teaching Posts vide Order No. 1697-Edn(cs) dated 06.10.1986.

Sri Subhas Krishna Thakur joined as Lecturer in Political Science on 21.01.1987. He also took the chair as Teacher-in-Charge on 21.01.1987 to 07.12.1987. Dr. Ganga Sankar Chatterjee joined as Principal on and from 08.12.1987. After that four Lecturers joined in different subjects. The Student strength was only 45 (forty five) in Pass level. No Honours course was introduced at that time. Only 22 (twenty two) students appeared in B.A. (Pass) final examination and only 6 (six) students were passed. No concrete building was constructed at that time. There were four rooms which were made with tin shed and 'Darma' (bamboo). The financial position was very poor. The construction of Class rooms No. 5, 6, 7 and 8 was started before 1990. DRDA sanctioned amounting to Rs. 2 lac for building construction and Higher Education Department, Government of West Bengal sanctioned Rs. 3 lac for constructing building.

1991 – 1995:

The Class rooms No. 5, 6, 7 and 8 were completed in this period. Further, the stair cases of first floor and class rooms No. 9 and 10 were constructed in this period but the flooring work was incomplete. At that time the student's strength was very poor and the result was not remarkable. The Library position was not good. The total furniture and number of benches were not up to the mark. At that time the 2(f) registration from UGC was approved vide letter No. F No.8-1/95 (CPP-I) dated 21st March 1995. At that time, the Higher Education Department, Govt. of West Bengal sanctioned amounting to Rs. 10,000/- (Rupees ten

thousand) only for purchasing Books for Library. The Higher Education Department was sanctioned a full time teaching post in Education.

1996 - 2001:

In 1996 the Higher Education Department sanctioned one teaching post i.e., Geography and also sanctioned one Lab attendant post for Geography. Further, the Higher Education Department was sanctioned Rs. 5 (five) lac for constructing building. Further, the College authority started two class rooms No. 11 & 12 of 1st floor and some works were incomplete. Further, the Higher Education Department sanctioned Rs. 25 (twenty five) thousand for Library books and Rs. 10 (ten) thousand for Games & sports. The first grant from UGC was received in the year 1996-97 amounting to Rs. 1 (one) lac for equipments, one lac for building, 1.7 lac for Library and Rs. 40,402/- (Rupees forty thousand four hundred two) only for teachers scholarship. In 2001 only 40 students were appeared in B.A. (two year) Pass final examination and 15 students obtained 2nd Class and 11 students passed. In 2001-2002, the new course B.Com at pass level was introduced but admission was started 2002.

2002 - 2006:

In 2002, the total students strength was 335 and 16 students appeared in final examination in which 6 students obtained 2nd class and 7 students passed. At that time the College fund as per Audit Report viz, Closing balance Rs. 4, 71,800/- and fixed deposit Rs. 1.5 lac. The total number of books at Library was 4194. B.Com (Pass Level) admission started with 16 students for the session 2002-2003. No teaching staffs were sanctioned by the Government for conducting the B.Com course. We have no sufficient money to continue the B.Com course. So the Governing Body stopped the admission for B.Com in the year 2004. After 2002, two new teaching post was sanctioned by the Higher Education Department, Govt. of West Bengal. In that time, five full time teachers joined. We have introduced four Honours subjects viz, History, Geography, Bengali and Education. Further, the College authority started new construction viz. teacher's room, Principal's room, Office room, toilet, water line, boundary wall, and water reservoir and supply line. In this period, the college received Rs. 5 lac from M.P.L.A.D fund, Rs. 5 lac from Zella Parishad, Rs. 8.33 lac from M.P.L.A.D for boundary wall. We received from UGC 2.25 lac for building construction, Rs. 60,000/- for books and Rs. 45,000/- for equipments. We have introduced Computer training centre for general students for Computer training. After few years they could not be continued due to internal and external political disturbances.

2007 - 2011:

The Higher Education Department, Govt. of West Bengal sanctioned five new teaching posts viz. English, History, Geography, Education and Bengali in which two full time teachers joined. In this period we have started the construction of Students' Union room, Canteen room, Cycle Garage, Deep tube well, two Notice Board and Women's Hostel. Further, the UGC sanctioned amounting to Rs. 63,88,316/- for different heads viz. Building, Women's Hostel, Remedial Coaching, Entry-in-service, Books, Equipments, Students stipend etc. In this period Higher Education Department sanctioned Rs. One lac for Books and furniture. The college also received Rs. 10 lac. from MPLAD fund for constructing two class rooms. The college started the Women's Hostel under the financial assistance of UGC. We introduced Distance Education Post Graduate courses viz. Bengali, English, History, Political Science, Sanskrit in M.A. and M.Sc in Geography from DDE, Vidyasagar University.

<u>2012 – 2015:</u>

The college started new construction i.e., Second floor and stair cases. Further, the college authority started the conference room cum Seminar Hall & smart class, IQAC and meeting room, Modern Library room, well decorated reading room, NSS and Alumni Association room. All are under the CCTV control. Six office counters along with shed, all drainage system including slab -structure, Rs.75 lac deposited to the PWD office for constructing new four storied building and the college authority is going to purchase three bighas of land for second campus. We arranged Rain water Harvesting, Gymnasium for Girl's students, Medicinal Plantation, adopted village for social work, animal nursing, signed MOU with Orion for opening Vocational courses from UGC for fashion designing, Mobile networking and Computer Hardware. At present, the total number of Library books are 10435, Total 35 Computers, 4 - Laptops, 5 Water cooler machines, two smart class room, 22 A.C. machines (split & window), well furnished Geography department, Geography Lab along with Smart class room and 18 fire extinguishers. All are under CCTV (23 numbers) control and Air conditioned. Wi-Fi zone, large number of furniture, beautiful play ground, concrete pathway, three Generators (35 KV, 25 KV and 6 KV), Solar light system, Animal care MOU with NGO, Question Bank, Digital Library, Kanyasree Prakalpa, Minority stipend, SC/ST/ OBC stipend, Railway Concession etc. In this period, the UGC sanctioned amounting to Rs. 74, 26,024/- for above said development. Beside that the Higher Education Department also sanctioned Rs.66, 10,000/- for above development. In this period, two full - time teachers joined the post of Assistant Professors. Five full time Assistant Professor posts are lying

vacant. We already submitted all the requisite papers to the West Bengal College Service Commission to fill up the five vacant assistant professor posts. At present, as per our Audit report for the year 2014-2015 the closing balance is Rs.1,23,99,338.02 and fixed deposit is Rs.1,18,23,388/-. We are proud of collecting minimum fees from the students, our result is remarkably sound. The college have 54% Minority students, 55% girls' students, 19% SC&ST students and 22% OBC students (approx). In this pathway, we are going to reach our goal. In this year (2015), the college authority opened the DDE Centre from Rabindra Bharati University and course offered viz. M.A. in Bengali, History, Education and Geography. We will assist them and consultancy fees will be received from them with proper processing.

After the change of West Bengal State Government in 2011, rapid progress has been achieved with the guidance of the Principal and Sri Rathin Ghosh, President of the Governing Body and the assistance of the teaching and Non-teaching staffs. Earlier this progress was resisted due to internal and external Political problems. At present, the total students strength for the session 2014-2015 is 2119 and library. Books are 10435 and all are internet connected computer facilities.

1.1 CURRICULUM, PLANNING AND IMPLEMENTATION

1.1.1 VISION MISSION AND OBJECTIVES OF THE INSTITUTION

- The name of 'Vivekananda College' is chosen to pay our homage to Swami Vivekananda, the great patriot and social reformer and eternal embodiment of the soul of India and a great inspiring force behind the making of modern India. Swami Vivekananda who firmly believed that education, was the manifestation of the perfection in man. Vivekananda College, Madhyamgram, borrows its inspiration from the golden thoughts of Swamijee who remains to this day the beacon light of our destiny, hopes and aspirations. We have, in keeping with the strength and conviction of such time tested truths, set audacious goals. Our objective is to raise the overall academic standard with a conscious adherence to the time tested as adage that the true purpose of education is not mere erudition but bearing that helps in man making and character building. The College has the vision of raising the institution to a very high standard in respect of teaching, learning, result, administration and academic atmosphere in the College campus, so that it becomes one of the premier institutions of the Country.
- ➤ Our teachers always tried to grow up the sense of discipline, self-respect, sacrifice, devotion and love of nation among the embodied soul of the students'. We taught them always to believe in mankind and follow the statement 'Live and let live' in your daily practical life. We try to wake up the 'Sense of duty' in the students' mind. The objectives like advancement of learning for personality and career development, cultivating qualities requisite for good and responsible citizenship and involvement in community life along with acquisition of academic knowledge and personal values.
- ➤ Our students observed 5th September as Teachers' Day (birthday of Sarbapalli Radhakrishnan). The Principal addressed before the central gathering of the students and explain the vision and mission of our Institution.
- ➤ The College authority observed 12th January as Vivekananda's birthday. The Principal and the President of the Governing Body addressed the students to follow the Vivekananda's idea, vision & mission.

- ➤ Every year at the time of admission the College publishes an elaborate Prospectus, comprising vision, mission and achievements of the Institution. The Prospectus is distributed to the students, members of the Governing Body, the University, the Higher Education Department, Govt. of West Bengal, teachers and the entire Nonteaching staffs. In this way, communication is to be built-up.
- ➤ Teachers Council took the important role to discuss with the Principal regarding academic affairs and how to smoothly run the College in peaceful manner. The resolutions of the meetings highlight the future course of action as far as teaching and learning are concerned.
- > The routine of the entire subjects is displayed in the Notice Boards, Teachers' Notice board and sent to the class room for photocopying to the students'.

1.1.2 ACTION PLAN FOR EFFECTIVE IMPLEMENTATION OF THE CURRICULUM

Vivekananda College, being an affiliated College, does not have the freedom to develop the prescribed University's curriculum. Even so, efforts are made, within the limitations of the prescribed frame work, to complement the curriculum wherever felt to be necessary. This task is left to the initiative of departments.

Beginning of the academic session, the College publishes a master routine, which indicates allotment of classes of each department. The master routine is walled up in the Notice Board in the teachers' room, all departments etc. Departmental heads allot the classes to his/her departmental colleagues. The routine is prepared in such a manner so that it enables a teacher to complete the curriculum prescribed by the University within a stipulated period. Then the Principal publishes the final routine to the College notice board, teachers' notice board, all departments' and also send the classrooms for photocopying of the students.

If any discrepancy arises in the routine for taking classes or subject combinations, then it would be solved by the Principal, IQAC co-ordinator and head of the departments.

Some teachers mainly Geography and Education departments take extra classes in addition their regular classes and some other Departments also take an initiative in this regard for completion of syllabus in time.

1.1.3 SUPPORT FROM THE UNIVERSITY/INSTITUTION

The West Bengal State University provides a syllabus of under graduate courses, which is available in the website of the University. The departmental heads and all the teachers supply the subject wise syllabus to the departmental students' in the class room. The College library preserves all the syllabus, questions paper, and last five years question bank for the students. The University publishes academic calendar containing the probable date's annual Test examinations of each year and also final examinations. Departmental heads organized the class test in different subjects frequently.

The massive renovation of the College infrastructure as well as the up gradation of the Library, Geography equipments and well furnished A.C. Lab facilities, A.C. smart class rooms, Education Lab facilities in the recent years is a case in point. The research interests of teachers are encouraged and their achievements are specially applauded. The initiatives of teachers are encouraged.

The Principal convenes a meeting of the academic sub-committee and IQAC in the beginning of each session. In that meeting, the Heads of the departments placed their suggestions before the Principal regarding effective measures on curriculum for improving the teaching practices. The College authority takes the appropriate action on the suggestions of the Heads of the departments for improving the teaching and learning process and practices.

1.1.4 THE CONTRIBUTION OF THE COLLEGE FOR CURRICULUM DELIVERY

Efforts are made to ensure that the curriculum is implemented efficiently and innovatively. This includes a wide variety of things from the recruitment of faculty, work culture, institutional vision, super vision and review through departmental meetings — Students'-Faculty-Committee meetings as well as the Principal's meeting with the departments- the efficient functioning of the Tutorial systems, Remedial coaching and Entry-in-service. Apart from class room teaching, other programmes like Seminars and work-shops are held for the benefit of the students. Teachers also attend Orientation and Refresher courses and thus the teachers after completion of such courses try to motivate the students' for better results. Two smart class rooms are well equipped with LCD projectors and Computers to enhance the use of ICT in teaching methodology.

1.1.5 INSTITUTION NETWORKS

The College encourages the teachers of all departments to interact with external agencies for the more effective implementation of the curriculum.

- Excursion and field survey are the essential parts of the curriculum of the departments like Geography and Education. Most of all the departments arranged such excursions and field survey with active support from the College.

The college authority published the Book 'Bangobibhag' edited by Dr. Somdatta Mondal & Dr. Sukla Hazra on September 2002.

She holds the Post of course Co-ordinator of P.G. courses of Distance Education under DDE, Vidyasagar University and Rabindra Bharati University.

1.2 ACADEMIC FLEXIBILITY

1.2.1 SPECIFYING GOALS AND OBJECTIVES

The College offered a Computer Training Certificate course i.e., PC- Application Courses for two years. In this regard, the College signed a MOU with Weblel Informatics Limited (A

Govt. of West Bengal Undertaking) of 225F, A.J.C. Bose Road, (4th Floor) Kolkata – 700 020 on 1st July 2004 for the academic session 2004-2005. The expired time of MOU was on August 2008. This Course helped the students to develop their Computer basic knowledge. The authority of Webel Informatics Limited pressurized us to arrange all students to get admission in this course. A large number of students are not interested to get the admission. So they demonstrated before the Governing Body against mandatory admission in Computer training centre. So the Governing Body requested the authority of the Computer Centre to continue admission only among the interested students. But the authority of Webel Informatics Limited was not agreed with our proposal. So they stopped the Computer Training Centre on and from 1st September 2006. The authority of Weble Informatics Limited issued the Certificates who passed the Computer basic training courses examination.

Further, the College authority signed a MOU with Orion Edutech Private Ltd. on 11th day of March 2015 for introducing the skill development courses viz, i) **B-VOC in Apparel Manufacturing & Designing, ii) B-VOC in Cloud & Mobile Software Engineering & iii) Diploma in Hardware & Networking Courses**. In this regard, we demonstrated on 2nd July 2015 before the Expert Committee of University Grants Commission, New Delhi – 110002 for sanctioning grant. The above Vocational Courses are very much helpful to our Graduate students and running students.

1.2.2 PROGRAMMES THAT FACILITED DUAL DEGREE

The College does not offer any such programme as it is an affiliated Institution. However, Webel Informatics Private Limited issued certificates on 2006, those students who passed Computer basic Training courses within 2006. Already we explained in column No. 1.2.1.

1.2.3 INSTITUTIONAL PROVISIONS TO ENSURE ACADEMIC FLEXSIBILITY

The College offers three year B.A. Honours courses in 4 subjects viz, Bengali, English, History and Education. Three year General courses are taught in the subjects like English, Bengali, History, Education, Geography, Political-Science and Philosophy.

The College also offers three year B.Sc Honours course in Geography subject.

All the above courses enjoy permanent affiliation of the West Bengal State University.

Subjects like English, Bengali are clubbed as Language Group. Subjects like History, Political-Science and Education are also interrelated. Literature has also close link with History and Philosophy. The Subject Geography is also interrelated with Philosophy, History, Political-Science and Education. Teacher of one department speaks in the class of other related subjects. Such lecturer enriches the students leading to lateral mobility of the curriculum. The College encourages interdisciplinary lectures to increase the lateral mobility of the curriculum.

1.2.4 SELF FINANCE PROGRAMMES

We have no Self-financed Programmes at present.

1.2.5 ADDITIONAL SKILL ORIENTED PROGRAMMES

The College authority already submitted the Proposals for XII Plan Guideline for Deen Dayal Upadhyay Centres for Knowledge Acquisition and Up gradation of Skilled Human abilities and livelihood (KAUSHAL) Project scheme to the University Grants Commission office for introducing Vocational Courses viz, Apparel Manufacturing & Designing (B-VOC), Cloud and Mobile Software Engineering (B-VOC) and Diploma in Hardware and Networking. Already the College authority demonstrated the details project report before the Expert committee of UGC at New Delhi for sanctioning the grant to introduce the above said courses.

The college provides Post Graduate Courses in Bengali, English, History, Political Science,

Sanskrit and Geography under the Directorate of Distance Education of Vidyasagar University, West Midnapur, West Bengal. The approval of P.G. Study Centre of DDE, VidyasagarUniversty was achieved long back on 3rd September, 2010 (Ref. No. VU / DDE / 3969 / 2010). The Centre Code for this study centre is V.U.-022. Further, the college also provides PG courses viz. Bengali, History, Education and Geography under DDE of Rabin Bharti University, Kolkata vide letter no.DDE/RBU/DR/0238(B)/15 dated.06/03/2015.

Vivekananda College was comparable to a primary school till the year 2002. In that year Dr. Chandan Kr. Chakraborty took the chair of the principal and the college started spreading wings on the path of advancement. The results of this college started getting better with the help of the principal, the teaching staffs along with the non-teaching staffs and none but the hard-working students. More students from renowned schools rushed in for getting admitted in this college. The principal gave a thought for letting the students of this college to get opportunity for getting into P.G. Course in this college only. Most of the students of this college are from backward families and they can be denoted as first generation learners, being so it was next to impossible for them to get into regular course of P.G. courses and that is the reason the Governing body along with the Principal wanted to initiate P.G. course (Distance) immediately. Thus, Vivekananda College applied for being a study centre of DDE, Vidyasagar University. 1.3 CURRICULUM ENRICHMENT

1.3.1 SUPPLEMENTING THE UNIVERSITY CURRICULUM

Our college is affiliated to the West Bengal State University the curricula for different courses are framed by the Under Graduate Board of Studies of different subjects. Therefore there is no scope for flexibility in the matter of devising or designing the syllabus or curricula. The college has to abide by the curricula framed by the University. The college is aware of the importance of preparing students in the competitive ambience of modern times.

> The Governing Body opened its NSS unit in one under the leadership of programme officer, Professor Animesh Golder. The programmes organized by the NSS provide

students ample scope to interact with the world outside their academically defined boundaries.

- ➤ Educational tours are regularly conducted by the Department of Geography and Education.
- The college organizes its Annual Sports meet in the second week of February.
- > The college magazine is published.
- Cultural activities like special music programmes on the Birth Anniversary of Tagore, Song competition debates quiz contest are held so that the mission of the college and academic activities are well integrated.
- > Special Lectures on current affairs are organized so that students keep themselves abreast of contemporary issues.
- ➤ Blood donation camps and Aids Awareness programmes are conducted.
- Project based work is offered by the Department of Geography and Department of Education.
- > ICT based teaching aids (like- overhead projector, LCD and Laptop) are used for the overall welfare of students.
- > Faculty exchange programmes are organized to provide a viable platform for the dissemination of ideas and sharing of academic advancement.

1.3.3 CROSS CUTTING ISSUES

Programmes have been organized by the college to address issues which are socially relevant: eminent scholars have been invited to deliver lectures on human rights, taxes, sanitation, and environment global warming, linking to river plantation etc. A seminar on "investment" was organized in November 2014 by Securities and Exchange Board (SEBI); a talk on the importance of: "Hand Wash" was conducted recently to educate teachers and students on the importance of cleanliness and sanitation.

The Governing Body of the college has also formed a cell to look into the grievances of students and teachers. The women cell deals with problems faced by women in the work place. The VISHAKHA guidelines are strictly adhered to.

- The Environment examination is compulsory for students of BA 1st year class.
- > Seminars, workshop and field trips are organized regularly
- As the institution inspired by the ideals of Swami Vivekananda the college organizes special programme on 12th January (National Youth Day)
- ➤ Blood donation camps are organized and these camps are variables preceded by lectures on the importance of Blood donation.

1.3.4 VALUE ADDED COURSES

The NSS unit of the college was opened in 2007. Since inception the NSS unit of the college has organized programmes with clear focus on service to the poor. This is all the more significance as the college is situated in rural areas and the inhabitants are monthly farmers, day labours, small business owners, shop keepers etc. The financial situation of these poor residents is precarious and the NSS volunteers of our college visit these poor households to teach their children and acquaint them with the basis of education. The college authority ensures that moral and ethical values are inculcated in the students through lectures and through stress on social work. A lecture on Swami Vivekananda's concept of education was delivered by Swami Divyanandajce in 2010.

Students regularly participate in socially and culturally relevant activities like:

- > Organizing rallies on the importance of sanitation.
- ➤ Visit the old and ailing people in the vicinity and making arrangements for medicine etc.
- > Organizing compassing to ensure a plastic free campus.

1.3.5 USE OF FEED BACK SYATEM

Feedback forms are collected. Parent and Teacher meetings are held and the discussion making body keeps itself abreast of all resolutions. On the basis of the suggestions offered by the parents the following steps have been taken:

- ➤ Introduction the post graduate degree course in Distance mode
- > Opening the new campus to introduce Science stream.

1.3.6 MONITORING ENRICHMENT PREGREMMES

The IQAC of the college established in 2013 monitors and evaluates the quality of teaching and learning; it also sets ambitions standards.

- ➤ The Grievance Redressal Cell established by the Governing Body of the college looks into all problems and complains adopted in such meetings.
- ➤ Reviewers are made of college tests and University exam results small units of students are farmed and module tests are conducted.
- Class tests are regularly conducted
- The resolutions adopted in Teachers council meetings, parent teacher meetings and results of test examinations are submitted for consideration by the Governing Body of the college to take related measures and adopt corrective steps for improvement of results.

1.4 FEEDBACK SYSTEM

1.4.1 CONTRIBUTIONS OF THE INSTITUTION IN DESIGN OF THE UNIVERSITY CURRICULUM

Being an affiliate of the West Bengal State University, there is no scope for amendment on revision of syllabus and curriculum. The only link between the University and the college is the Undergraduate Board of Studies of which few our Teachers play a significant role in formulating the curriculum.

1.4.2 FORMAL MECHANISM TO OBTAINED FEED BACK

No such activities. But to an extent indirectly faculty of the college attend seminars on academic issues and discuss curriculum enrichment with their peers. TEACHING, LEARNING AND EVALUATION

2.1 STUDENTS ENROLMENT AND PROFILE

2.1.1 PUBLICITY AND TRANSPARENCY IN ADMISSION PROCESS

The admissions to all courses are entirely merit based and are conducted online from 2015. This has ensured transparency and reduced hassles for students all of whom are new entrants to the area of higher learning.

After the publication of Higher Secondary results, the college invites applications for admission to various courses on offer and provides a considerable window of time to allow students to cogitate on the choice of subjects and the viability of electing to pursue such courses. The prospectus of the college helps students to select subjects.

The admission committee of the college meets at regular intervals to make assessments and the process being conducted online. There are no allegations of repotion on corruption at any level. This is followed by a system of personal interviews and counseling.

The website of the college which caters exclusively to the admissions process is fully functional. The college website provides all information regarding admission.

In addition to the prospectus of the college, the college website keeps prospective students regularly updated regarding cut off marks, conditions and criteria of eligibility, the intake capacity of the college and important dated (e.g. distribution and price of admission forms, last date of submission etc).

The merit list of the college is displayed on the college notice board as well as the college website. Counseling of both Honours and General candidates takes place after the publication of the first merit list and after admission of successful and willing candidates to different courses; the second merit list is published. This process continues till a skiable number of students have been admitted and classes most often begin by the second week of July taking into consideration often factors like University examination etc.

2.1.2 ADMISSION PROCESS

Admission of students to various courses is strictly merit based. After publication of Higher Secondary results and submission of admission forms, the teachers of the various Departments of the college adopt the standard to be accepted for admission.

The classes are organized on and from 4th September, 2010 to 30th September 2012. The total no of students i.e. 409 (four hundred nine) were benefited through this above said coaching classes. The total no of teachers 15 (fifteen) were involved to teach them. Students are more benefited to attend the Remedial Classes for appearing before the final examination during the session 2011-2012.

We could not able to fully utilize the recurring and non- recurring grant due to non-functioning of the Governing Body of the College during the period 2010, 2011 and middle of the year 2012. So we are refunding the rest of the amount along with the 10% interest per annum to UGC office. We hope that in future, we must utilize the sanctioned money.

REPORT OF THE CO-ORDINATOR (15.12.2014)

The office work of Remedial Coaching at Vivekananda College, Madhyamgram, North 24 Parganas, Kolkata-700129 for admission to attend the Remedial Coaching was arranged on and from 1st October, 2013 to 30th June 2014. The classes are organized on and from 16th November, 2013 to 30th September 2014. The total no of students i.e. 62 (Sixty two) were benefited through this above said coaching classes. The total no of teachers 3 (Three) were

involved to teach them. Students are more benefited to attend the Remedial Coaching Classes for appearing before the final Examination during the session 2013-2014.

The classes were organized on and from 23.09.2010 to 21.11.2010. The total no of students i.e. 22(Twenty two) were benefited through this above said coaching classes. The total no of teachers 03 (Three) were involved to teach them. Students are more benefited to attend the Entry-in- Service Classes for facing the Competitive examination of SSC, Bank, Rail, Police etc. We could not able to utilize the re-curing grant due to non-functioning of the Governing Body at present. We are expecting to utilize the rest of the amount which is in our hand be spent within December, 2011 after forming the newly constituted Governing Body.

The Classes were organized on and from 01.06.2013 to 30.06.2014. The total no of students i.e. 50 (fifty) were benefitted through this above said Coaching Classes. The total no of teachers are 02(two) were involved to teach them. Students are more benefited to attend the Entry-in-Service classes for facing the Competitive Examination of SSC, Bank, Rail, Police etc. One student has gotten Service in Primary Teacher. Some students have gotten their services in various departments.

2.2 CATERING OF STUDENT DIVERSITY

2.2.1 DIFFERENTLY ABLED STUDENTS

- ➤ The College has always shown a favourable attitude to differently-abled students. The Institution strictly follows all Government rules and regulations regarding admission of the differently-abled students. The College admits visually challenged and physically able students in certain Departments. These students are given extra care and attention by the course teachers to enable them to learn and perform better.
- > They are given special guidance and counseling by the teachers of the respective departments. This personalized attention often brings about a dramatic transformation both in terms of academic results and self confidence levels.
- ➤ Reservation is strictly followed to provide admission to the differently-abled students. The differently-abled (visually challenged and physically challenged) students are given special attention by providing them learning aids.
- ➤ College constructed ramps at in front of the main College building to ensure comfortable movement for the differently-abled students as per government policy. In case of (any special) need for any differently-abled student, classes are shifted to the ground floor accordingly. The same is done during examination process. For example, additional time is given as per the rule.
- ➤ The college has shown sensitivity in making the differently-abled students a part of the college mainstream and giving them a sense of independence and achievement. The generous financial help provided to such students in the form of fee waivers and scholarships.

2.2.2 KNOWLEDGE AND SKILLS

Most of the students admitted here from rural areas and have completed their school education in the regional language (Bengali Medium). Senior professors and tutors-in charge address the students to acquaint them with academic and non-academic programmes in College. Students enter college with varying skills and levels of knowledge. It is important to identify students who need extra guidance so that they can be brought on par with their peer group. Before the start of the programme, a Department Orientation and interaction is organised. Skill development is a major aspect of the holistic education college imparts to students. In line with this vision, computer literacy, increasing competency levels in spoken and written English are emphasized. Assignments and presentation of their work in an interactive manner by incorporating pictures, images, slides, audio and video materials in

presentations is encouraged. Immediately after the commencement of class basic knowledge and shortcomings of students are judged by the teachers through one to one interaction. The teachers usually spend a few classes for recapitulation of the previous subject matters to bridge the gap, if any.

2.2.3 STATEGIES TO BRIDGE KNOWLEDGE GAP AND PROGRAMMES

To bridge the knowledge gap of the enrolled students and to enable them to cope with the programme of their choice special as well as tutorial classes are arranged. Teachers make personal contact sessions for advancement of the slow learners. Personalized interaction with the teachers helps the students to eliminate their weak points. The teachers guide them to prepare model answers by providing books, reading materials and advice. 'Parents-teachers' meetings are organized, where the parents may freely express their views on student related matters and the teachers may communicate their observations on the progress of their wards. Students also interact regularly with teachers outside the classroom either individually or in groups to address their course related or other general problems. Remedial classes are conducted for SC, ST and BC students under UGC allotted funds.

2.2.4 SENSITIZATION ON GENDER, INCLUSION AND ENVIRONMENT

Students and staff of the College are sensitized on different issues in various manners.

- ➤ The College has constituted the Internal Complaints Committee (ICC) in compliance with the Prevention of Sexual Harassment Act of 2013. The task of raising awareness in this regard is cast upon this very competent committee.
- ➤ International Women's Day celebrated every year to spread awareness among the staff, students and teachers of the College about women's issues.
- Various activities are organized by the NSS unit of the College throughout the year like cleaning of the College campus, awareness programme in slum areas in which students and teachers actively participate. Hand Wash Day is observed in college campus.
- ➤ The College has established a Gender Sensitization and Awareness against Sexual Harassment Cell which organizes lecture series at regular intervals for sensitizing the students and staff on gender issues.
- ➤ It is an institutional policy to impart quality education, even to the less privileged sections of society. The location of the College, the courses offered and the overall atmosphere serve to attract large number of students from the minority (Muslim)

community, many of whom are first generation learners. The growing number of students from the minority community indicates the positive approach and efforts made by the institution towards inclusion.

2.2.5 ADDRESSING SPECIAL LEARNING NEEDS

Remedial coaching was introduced for this purpose.

2.2.6 COLLECTION AND USE OF DATA ON ACADEMIC PERFORMANCE

All relevant information of admitted students is preserved in the College office. Results of College and University examinations are preserved in the College office as well as in the respective departments. Slow learners are identified and given remedial education. They are encouraged to keep individual contact with the teachers. Taking into the strength and weakness, the slow learners are given additional support whenever possible. The teachers take individual care to remove their difficulties in understanding the subject matters. A number of ways are adopted for their support both financially and socially.

- ➤ To maintain the parity with the national commitment for inclusion of the socially weaker section of the society, along with the advantage of reservation, stipends and scholarships sponsored by the State Government and UGC are awarded to the students of SC/ST and OBC categories.
- > Students from the Minority community avail stipends sponsored by Minority Affairs Department of the Govt. of West Bengal.
- ➤ Kanyashree Scholarships offered by the State Government to the deserving girl students have been introduced from the last academic year.

- > Free studentship (full/half) is extended by the Government of West Bengal to deserving candidates on the recommendation of the Principal.
- ➤ The College extends financial assistance for books and study materials to the economically weaker students from its Students "Aid Fund" created by the College itself.

2.3 TECHING LEARNING PROCESS

2.3.1 PLANNING AND EXECUTION

Academic calendar-2013-14, 2014-15 and 2015-16 .after publication of Academic Calendar by the affiliating University, the college prepares its academic calendar following the broad outline of the University. Special care is taken to ensure that the academic calendar of the college contains details of every aspect of the college especially tentative dates of commencement of classes, class test dates, schedules of selection test etc.

The detail layout of the teaching plan is offered in the academic calendar which is based on the syllabus provided by the affiliating University. The college follows the process of continuous evaluation which includes class test, assignments (in Geography and Education) project work etc. The record of all examinations is scrupulously maintained by the Departments.

2.3.2 HOW DOES THE IQAC CONTRIBUTE TO IMPROVE THE TEACHIN LEARNING PROCESS

Despite the fact that the IQAC is a post accreditation body, the achieve initiative by the Principal of the college and enthusiasm generated by his actions in this regard, on the recommendation of the Governing Body of the college, the IQAC of the college was formed in 2013. Since then the IQAC has worked as a determined agent to being about positive reform in the affairs of the college by continuous improvement of innovation in curricular co-curricular and extracurricular activities.

- > The meetings of the IQAC are held every four months.
- > The IQAC takes active interest in processing the papers for the promotion of teachers.
- > The IQAC in the last few years has taken steps to organize extension lectures, organizing seminars workshop etc.

2.3.3 STUDENT CENTRIC LEARNING

The students of our college are form a semi-infra and usual background with limited resources at their disposal. One of the challenges of the teachers of our college is to make the teaching learning process compatible with the average attitude of students.

- > Students are encompared to attend seminars and are inspired to average students seminars, class room seminars and Departmental projects.
- > Tutorial formed an integral part of the college time table and have to a great extent, remedial academic deficiencies of the students
- ➤ Participatory learning activities like quiz compition, Departmental wall magazine, college magazine are some of the student centric activities of the college.
- > Student benefit from ICT mode of learning: a gradual shift from the lecture method to the power point presentation method of teaching is discernible in the college which has benefited students directly.
- > The Department of Geography has well equipped laboratory with all modern amenities
- ➤ The library of the college to which students have ready accepted has 10,435 books and journals. Apart from this the library is centrally air conditioned with a reading room. Students are encouraged to make regular visit to the library
- > In order to make learning more interactive, all the Departments have been provided computers
- > There is 100% Wi-Fi connectivity in the campus to enable students to access internet facilities un interrupting

2.3.4 NURTURING CRITICAL THINKING, CREATIVITY AND SCIENTIFIC TEMPER

The college takes the efforts to nurture critical thinking and creativity by adopting the following strategies:

- > Students are encouraged to contribute their articles in various journals; the college magazine etc. students of same Departments also bring out wall magazines. The college magazine "college scope" contains articles mainly by our leavers in which their creative and critical articles are evident.
- > Teachers and staff members encourage students to use the college library which has 10,435 books, news papers and periodical journals.
- > Students are encouraged to present papers in seminars conducted in the college. Students participate in debates and quiz competition.

- ➤ Educational tours to academic institutions and historical places are regular feature of the teaching learning process. This is academically imperative for the Departments of Geography and Education. Other Departments of the college also encourage such participatory activities by students.
- Extracurricular activities like cultural events and extension activities like social work through NSS are organized regularly and students actively engage in all such work as and when mandated by the college.

2.3.5 TECHNOLOGY AND FACILITIES AVAILABLE

Students and teachers find themselves in a comfortable academic ambience due to the introduction of several technological facilities:

2.3.6 ADVANCED LEARNING

- > The college provides internet facilities to all students and teachers for academic purposes
- ➤ Field based project learning and field trips organized by the Department of Geography and Department of Education.
- > Teachers of the college are encouraged to attend Orientation Programme and Refresher courses for the fulfillment of their promotional requirements and to update themselves.

2.3.7 DETAILS ON THE ACADEMIC, PERSONAL AND PSYCHO-SOCIAL SUPPORT AND GUIDANCE

The college has a student's Welfare Cell as also an Employee Beneficial Committee. There is regular interaction between students and teachers.

- There is no formal mechanism of providing Psycho-social support to students of our college
- > Students are provided financial help in the form of concessions stipends, kanyasree scholarship etc.
- > Academic support in the form of opportunities given to students to make use of available similes like the well equipped library internet etc.
- > Tutorial classes and remedial classes for students who need coaching outside class homes are analyzed.
- > Overall academic counseling is done by the Principal of the college

2.3.8 INNOVATIVE TEACHING METHODS AND APPROACHES

The physical infrastructure has been remarkably improved. At present the library enjoys a space of 92.86 Sq. mts. Along with 36.19 Sq. metres reading room. Total automation of library service has been initiated. Internet service has been made available to the library users. The library and reading room are under the CCTV control.

The College has no power to recruit full time teachers. When the normal vacancy either occurred or created new post then the College authority at first authenticated the 100-Point Teaching Appointment Roster from the Backward Class Welfare Department, Govt. of West Bengal for categorizing. Then the College authority sent requisitions to the West Bengal College Service Commission along with all necessary papers for recommending candidates of different respective subject posts to fill-up the vacancy. The West Bengal College Service Commission recommended candidates names to fill-up the vacancy. After that the Governing Body appoints them. However, the College is to meet the problem of scarcity of teachers by appointing Guest Lecturers. There is a Selection Committee formed by the Governing Body and the Guest Teachers are selected by the Selection Committee. Sometimes the College requests retired teachers to take some classes for the benefit of the students.

2.4.2 NEW PROGRAMMES AND CHALLENGES

Newly introduced subjects and thus try to meet the growing demand of the students.

- ➤ In time of introducing the Honours course like, Bengali, History, Geography, Education and English use to take classes by the Guest teachers along with full-time teachers.
- ➤ Retired teachers of Political Science are taken the classes of general students. As an outcome of the above measures, the Institution benefited a lot, which was reflected in the satisfactory University results.

3.1 PROMOTION OF RESEARCH

Vivekananda College is primarily an undergraduate institution affiliated to West Bengal State University, Barasat. Although the college has facilities like Research archive, Library and seminar library to promote research, the University has not yet given its assent to open affiliated research centre in this college. However, the college has always promoted research among under graduate students. The practical based subjects like Geography and Education have their dissertation which is known as research oriented works.

3.1.2 Does the institution have research committee to monitor and address the issue of research?

In the year 2015 a research co-ordination committee was formed headed by the Principal of the college and consisted of co-ordinator of IQAC and members of teaching faculties who have already completed their PhD Degree. The committee promotes monitors and assess the Research activities within the institution. Representative from various departments activity involved in the field of Research.

3.2.3 Measures taken by the institution to facilitate smooth progress and implemental of research projects.

- Principal investigator must be a full time faculty member.
- > As soon as the research grant is received by the college from the UGC or any other funding agencies, it is immediately released by the authority, as per norms.
- ➤ The college provides ample space, infrastructural support, experimental garden, 24hours uninterrupted water supply, books, journals from the library and 24 hours power back up.
- ➤ All the non teaching laboratory staff members in laboratory and also library support and co-operation to successful run the research projects.
- > The members of teaching staff are allowed to attend seminar, workshop, and field work during the working hours, if possible.
- ➤ In 2015 two faculty members applied for MRP and the acceptance report is due still now.
- > The college provides the technical and informal facilities to its faculty members.
- > Departments of several subjects organize seminar lectures and the Departments invite eminent scholars and resource persons to deliver lectures in different topics.

- ➤ The mission of our college is to prepare future generations with good academic excellence.
- ➤ A good numbers of faculty members have published papers in different national and international journals.

3.2.4 Effort made by the institution in developing research culture among students.

The students have ample opportunities to consult with the faculty members regarding research oriented work. In practical based subjects (Geography & Education) have scope to do project work based on field work. The students of 3rd year Honours Students have to prepare the project reports in several subjects.

The project report has placed to the concerned Universities for evaluation. During these assignments, students are exposed and come contact with the teacher for research methodologies in general.

Besides, the 1st year and 2nd year Geography Honours students are always encouraged to prepare project reports in environment related topics through data collection, data analysis and mapping. The students prepare the maps with the departmental help of GIS (Geographical Information System) software (21st Century). Finally, they submit the reports to the concern Departments.

3.2.5 Faculty Involvement in active research.

It is mentioned that as under graduate affiliated college, we have no scope to take any decision regarding research as West Bengal State University do that. So the main goal is to prepare and encourage the students to do research oriented activities. No faculty members are directly achieved the Honour of research guide.

3.2.6 Give details of workshop/ training programmes organized by the institution.

- > The several departments organize seminars, lectures, competitions with or without collaborations with various organizations.
- ➤ Departmental seminars are organized severally. A special lecture was delivered by eminent person on "Population Studies" in the Department of Geography. Another special lecture was delivered by the resource person "Graphical representation of data: A brief discussion" in the department of Education.
- ➤ The students of Geography Departments visited "Geological survey of India" for details study on rocks and minerals with concerned teachers. They also visited NATMO (National Atlas and Thematic Mapping Organization) for advanced knowledge regarding plate maps and topographical maps. Besides, the Honours.

- Students severally visited "Census of India" for collecting census data, thematic maps and charts.
- ➤ Seven days workshop and training programme is organized by the department of Geography in collaboration with West Bengal State University on 'QGIS' (Open Source Software) on and from 03.10.2015 to 09.10.2015. Honorable Vice-Chancellor and Registrar inaugurated the workshop in presence of co-ordinator of Department of Geography, West Bengal State University. 'OPSIS' company Pvt. Limited gave the training to the faculties of different 20 colleges to introduce this open source in the under graduate curriculum.
- ➤ Department of Bengali arranged a National Seminar (UGC Sponsored) on "Bangla Natoke Protibad", in collaboration with Syamaprasad College on 8th and 9th March, 2013.
- ➤ Department of Bengali also arranged another National Seminar (UGC sponsor on "Bangla Uponaaser Protibadi Nari Charitra on 11th and 12th March, 2013 with collaboration of Mahadevananda College, Barrackpur, North 24 Parganas.
- > Department of Geography organized regular basis excursion tours in rural and urban areas to stimulation research interest among the students.
- ➤ Education tour has introduced in undergraduate curriculum to the Department of Education and Department of Education arranged a field tour at Santiniketan in 2015.

3.2.7 Details of initiatives taken up by the Institution in transfer of relative findings of research of the institution

The research co-ordination committee organized poster competition in the college campus by the students on their project works. The institution constantly encourages the faculty members to remain engaged in research work in respective fields. Encouragement by the institution has enabled many teachers to publish papers in journals of National and International repute with ISSN.

3.2 RESOURCE MOBILISATION FOR RESEARCH

3.2.1 Inter disciplinary Research

A general research environment has been set up by the institution in different subjects.

Department of Geography and Department of Education have encouraged the students to prepare project report on environmental issues. Both the Departments collaborate participated in statistical data collection from different organizations. These projects on research oriented works were aimed at improving their skills for doing a literature

- review practical support (Statistical data modeling) from the Department of Geography has similarly helped on research/ project works to the Department of Education.
- ➤ Besides Department of Bengali and Department of English have organized film show to create research oriented motivations among the students.

3.2.2 Optimal use of various equipments and research facilities of the institution by its staff and students.

- > The valuable instruments are preserved in a separate laboratory room and available to all the staffs and students. Instruments issue registrar has maintained for both the faculty members and students after duly informing the Head of the Department and the Principal of the college.
- > The weather station is set up to collect daily of weather phenomenon (temperature/rainfall/ wind speed) and the collected data is maintained in a log-book by the students.
- > Rain van is used in rainy season to collect the rain water and the amount is recorded by the students' month wise.
- > Total station is utilized for details plotting of whole campus area, built up area, playground etc.
- > Soil testing kit and water testing kit is used to examine water/ soil samples which are collected from field in different project works.

3.3 RESEARCH FACILITIES

- ➤ The college has well equipped laboratory which are provided with modern instruments such as dumpy level (Auto Dumpy), Theodolite, GPS (Global Positioning System), total station, weather station, rain van, licensed software(21st Century and TNT Mips basic) on GIS and Remote sensing, soil kit, water testing kit and SLR digital camera. The department of Geography has well maintained of these equipments for research purposes.
- ➤ 14 computers with two licensed software and one open source software in the laboratory in Department of Geography with full Wi-Fi connections are preserved for project purposes.
- > The all departments also provided seminar library consisting different reference books and journals for research purpose.






a. PHYSICAL FACILITIES





4.1.1 What is the policy of the institution for creation and enhancement of infrastructure that facilitate effective teaching and learning?

The Institution believes in growth and comes collectively and hence always tries to maintain a pace in infrastructural development and facilities effective teaching and learning. Any affordable facility that helps in enhancing the efficiency of teaching learning is always available.

4.1.2 Detail and facilities available for

Curricular and Co-curricular activities – Classrooms, technology enabled learning spaces, Seminar cum-conference hall along with smart class, tutorial spaces, laboratories, botanical garden, animal house, specialized facilities and equipments for teaching, learning and research etc.

As mentioned in it policy, the institute remains updated with the advanced teaching and learning equipment in all of its classrooms and laboratories. Some of such facilities are listed below:

- ➤ Almost all the departments of the College are having spacious classrooms and seminar rooms with regular access of the students.
- ➤ Each of the laboratories is well equipped to cater the requirements of the syllabus. Instruments are regularly serviced and monitored for accuracy.
- ➤ Other than the Seminar rooms at departments, there is an audio-visually well-equipped Seminar room with the seating capacity of more than 175. The room known as 'Vivekananda Hall' for Seminar Cum-conference and smart class room. Contains permanent audio-visual facilities and is air-conditioned. It is always made available to all the departments to host any seminars of any scale.
- ➤ There is one medicinal plant garden named, 'Ramakrishna Shasthya Niramoy Udyan' and a small botanical garden with rare species of plants maintained by the College.
- ➤ For effective teaching, learning the Geography and Education departments are provided LCD Projector. In addition to the same there are two smart class rooms which are made available to the teachers as and when necessary.
- ➤ The authority promotes research activities for both the faculty members and the student's space is made available always whenever any faculty member gets a project. However, there is policy of interdepartmental instrument sharing for better research activities.

> The **Research Guidance Cell** takes care of the student research project and the authority give them necessary financial and laboratory supports.

Extra-curricular activities- sports, outdoor and indoor games, Gymnasium, conference hall, NSS, Cultural activities, public speaking, communication skills development, Yoga, health & hygiene etc.

The institution believes in the principle of harmonious development of body, mind and soul. Keeping this in view, the institution always encourages the students to take part in extracurricular activities, cultural activities and sports.

- ➤ The College has an NSS unit, which actively works throughout the year. The unit concentrates in several programmes related to the awareness building and environmental issues. The volunteers of NSS unit regularly participate in campus cleaning drive, garden maintenance and removal of the plastic from the College campus.
- > NSS unit frequently organizes awareness programmes on blood related disease like, AIDS and other STDs, Thalassemia etc.
- ➤ It is also organizes health camps, blood donation camps, water fair, plantation programmes etc.
- ➤ Every year, the volunteers of NSS participate in a special camp at a nearby village, called Saradapally, Krishnapally, at present, the NSS unit is doing their job at Simulia at Kirtipur, North 24 Parganas. During the time of camp the students participates in awareness building, house hold survey, interact with local people and clean the region as a part of their social commitments.
- ➤ The College is going to apply the NCC office of Barrackpur to open two units in this College for Boys' & Girls' students.
- Our students frequently assist local Police in mob controlling, during the Durga puja & Kali Puja.
- ➤ The College authority in association with its students union, organize cultural activities regularly. Celebrated performers in different cultural fields are invited. At the same time, the College students also perform in these cultural programmes.
- > The institute also encourages the students to participate in different competitions and events organized by other institutions/organizations.
- > Some students also participated in various serials of respective TV Channels.

- ➤ The College has a separate competence Building Cell, which helps in identification, screening and guidance of students for participation in different events and competitions as well.
- During last few years the College is involved in organizing a Seminar lecture competition mainly Geography departmental students. This has been introduced with a view to enable our students to become stage free and also to gather efficiency in public speaking. As the consequence of such initiatives our students came out in flying colours in several competitions. They made commendable performance in poster competitions, science model competitions, quiz competition, extempore and or essay competitions.
- > The NSS unit basically takes care of the health programmes in College, which includes health check-up camps, maintenance of First Aid facilities and training.
- In regard to the maintenance of hygiene, the College has set up treated drinking water sources at all the floors. The food served in the canteen is also healthy and the authority keeps a regular vigil on the same.
- ➤ All the toilets of the institute are cleaned regularly to maintain a healthy ambience of the College.

4.1.3 How does the institution plan and ensure that the available infrastructure is in lying with its academic growth and is optimally utilized? Give specific examples of the facilities developed/augmented and the amount spent during the last four years (Enclose the Master Plan of the institution/campus and indicate the existing physical infrastructure and the future planned expansions if any)

The institute is having an array of different committees to look after infrastructural facilities available centrally. However, periodic academic committee meetings and review of activities by IQAC the use of departmental facilities are in lying with the requirement. The specific areas those are being used to monitor the use and abuse of resources in the concerned department are as follows:

- All the laboratory based Departments are having stock keeping records separately for equipments. The records are duly signed by the Head of the Department and counter signed by the Principal at certain intervals. Hence, authority can keep close eyes on whether all the instruments are being used or not.
- > There is a system of procuring students feedback time to time. These feedbacks indicate if there are any pitfalls in the access and use of instruments available for the students at departmental level.

4.1.4 How does the institution ensure that the infrastructure facilities meet the requirements of the students with physical disabilities? In particular case of physically challenge students, the feedback system turns to be very effective in ensuring that all the facilities could be provided to them as far as practicable.

In 2011-2012, the Election Commission has built-up ramps in front of the College gate of main building to facilitate the movement of the physically challenged students.

4.1.5 Give details on the residential facility and various provisions available within them:

Hostel Facility: Accommodation available:

The College has build up a Women's Hostel under financial assistance of UGC. The Hostel is completed in 2015. We invited applications from the girls' students to stay our girls Hostel through College website, Prospectus and The Statesman Patrika. Unfortunately we do not get any application in the session 2015-2016. Hope, we will get application from the girls' students in future.

- > Recreational facilities, Gymnasium, Yoga center etc.
- ➤ There is a Student Union cum common room comprising huge sports materials including cricket materials, football materials, Cheese materials, Carom boards, Badminton materials, Ludo etc. There are similar facilities in the girls' common room as well.

The College is planning to introduce a gymnasium in the College premises for girls' students. The College organized a Yoga Camp along with NSS at College campus with the help of Gurukul, Madhyamgram. The Gurukul ensured to arrange training for yoga in the College campus to times in a month. Our yoga centre will perform very well in this purpose.

4.1.6 What are the provisions made available to the students and staff in terms of health care on the campus and off the campus?

The College does not have any particular health care unit for the staff and students. But, the first aid are made available for them in campus and in case of serious injury or health issue immediate hospitalizations are done at nearest health care units, two of such types are situated within ½ Kilometres viz. Madhyamgram Primary Health Centre and Municipal Hospital. The facilities available are as follows:

➤ There are First Aid boxes available in campus, equipped with simple medicines, disinfectants, gauge, bandage materials, equipments like scissors, forceps etc. The maintenance of the boxes are done by NSS unit and Non-teaching staff of the College.

- > There are stretchers available for proper handling of ill students and staff members to the ambulance of any vehicle.
- > Some of the students got First Aid training by NSS authority. Our three non-teaching staff was getting training from St. Jones Ambulance on First Aid.
- > The NSS unit organizes health check up camps, intermittently, which includes Health Camps for general check up, ECG, blood Glucose testing, Eye testing etc.
- **4.1.7** Give details of the common Facilities available on the Campus spaces for special units like IQAC, Grievance Redressal Unit, Women's Cell, Counselling and Career Guidance, Placement unit, Health Centre, Canteen, Recreational spaces for staff and students, safe drinking water facility, Auditorium etc.
 - > The College has an IQAC, which is actively engaged in several development works and quality improvement of the institution. The IQAC along with the academic subcommittee endeavors for academic improvement of the institution. The cell also helps the authority by offering suggestions regarding building development and other facilities for the stakeholders.
 - ➤ The College has an active women's Cell, which looks after the problems of female staff and girls students, if any such problem crops up. The Cell also organizes awareness programmes in collaboration with other organizations.
 - > There is no regular Health Center in the College, but the NSS unit of the College occasionally organizes health check up programme for the students.
 - > There is a specious canteen within the College campus. There are two separate places for staff and the students. The canteen provides food at a subsidized rate.
 - > There are two specious common rooms for male and female students. In both the rooms recreational facilities are available, which includes Carom Boards, Television, Chees boards etc. The College has a plan to open a gymnasium for male students.
 - > The College provides safe drinking water facilities for the students and the staff by installing water purifiers in several places. We have five Blue Star water cooler machine for the students.
 - ➤ The College is going to construct a new four-storied building in which following facilities should be ensured to the students viz, one modern common room for girls' students, one cafeteria, one student common room (ground floor), one store room and one Gymnasium hall for Boy's students (first floor), two four hundred students capacity class rooms (second floor) and four Seminar cum class rooms for English Honours, Bengali Honours, History Honours and Education Honours (third floor).

The College already deposited Rs. 75 lac to the PW (Dte.) North 24 Parganas division, Govt. of West Bengal for starting the construction work. The soil testing work is going on.

4.2 LIBRARY AS A LEARNING RESOURCE

4.2.1 LIBRARY ADVISORY COMMITTEE

- ➤ There exist a Library Committee, which comprises the Principal, Bursar, Librarian and some other Teacher and Non-teaching members. The activity of this committee varies from recommendation of the Purchase of books proposed by different departments during the beginning of the session or the change in curriculum of the University. It was at the initiative of these committee, the College will be enlisted itself to NLIST. Another suggestion of this committee was to implement the OPAC system. Students have been given facility to an Open Access Reading Room with 5000 books (Approx).
- > The College has a well-designed web based portal through which students can search the availability of books in the Library.
- ➤ In addition to that, College is providing the Students access to N-LIST where student can access the full text of 1 lakh + e- books and 6000 e- journals free of cost. To facilitate and motivate the students for using the E-LIBRARY facility. Library has an exclusive E-LIBRARY browsing centre comprising 4-computers with high speed Internet facility.

More than 40% of students from each and every Honours Department got themselves admitted to the PG courses in different Universities. A large number of students of Geography and Education department are qualified Either SET Or NET. One student already obtained Ph D. in Geography. Two students are involved in Ph D. work in Geography. Some students obtained M.Phil degree and huge number of students get the job in Primary school, Madhyamick school, Higher Secondary School, College Part-time teacher, Railway Service, West Bengal Police service, Military service and Central and state Government services.

6.2 SRATEGY DEVELOPMENT AND DEPLOYMENT

6.2.1 Does the institution have a formally stated quality policy? How is it developed, driven, deployed and reviewed?

- As the college is decided to the enhancement of the teachings of Swami Vivekananda, it believes "Education is the manifestation of perfection already in man". As an educational institute the primary objectives of the College is to ensure high standard of academic achievement.
- > Every year a meeting of the teacher's council is held to decide the admission criterion for various departments.
- ➤ The College follows a unique method while preparing the admission list. The marks of the subject in which the candidate wishes to pursue honours course is added to the total of top four subjects, which then becomes the norm total. It is on this basis than the final list is prepared. Transparency is rigorously maintained in the admission process. The College one of first to extend Online Admission facility which has helped many candidates applying from afar.

- > The students are given to comprehensive idea about their course of study by the teachers and informed about the provisions like Computers, Library etc, the College has, to help them in their study.
- > To make an internal assessment of their academic progress, class tests and annual test examinations are held and the students are apprised of their shortcomings and the necessary steps to be taken for improvement.
- A regular review of attendance of the students is made and any delinquency is dealt with by involving the guardians of the students and working out a way to bring him/her back to the class room. This has proved to be an extremely fruitful measure and the response of the guardians has been overwhelming.

6.2.2 Describe the internal organizational structure and decision making processes.

- ➤ The College has a Governing Body, a Teachers council, an Academic Sub-committee, an IQAC team, a Finance Committee, Women's Cell, Purchase committee, Library Committee etc. All these bodies are actively supportive about the functioning well of the College.
- ➤ The Governing Body (G.B.) of the College is the supreme decision making body and the Principal as the Secretary of the G.B., implements the decisions. The Principal as per statutory power executes all the rules and regulations of the College as per Statue of the West Bengal State University.

6.3 FACULTY EMPOWERMENT STATEGIES

- ➤ The college authority goes on motivation and encouraging the teachers for their academic and professional development. A large number of teachers are released for their Refresher courses and orientation programmes by the Academic Staff College of different Universities.
- > Teachers are invited as Guest Faculty of West Bengal State University and the college authority gives the permission to that particular faculties.
- ➤ A large number of faculties published their research oriented papers in different National and International Journals with ISBN.
- > Training of computer operations has been extended to some Non-teaching staff for office works.
- ➤ The college always adopts the strategy of involving all the teaching and Non-Teaching staff in its day to day functioning.

- ➤ The University examinations are conducted through joint effort of teaching and non teaching staff.
- ➤ Department of Geography conduct the practical examinations of the University in every year both 2nd year and 3rd year honours students of different colleges.
