1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

Vivekananda College, Madhyamgram is an undergraduate college with three Post Graduate departments. The institution is situated at the northern fringes of Greater Kolkata. It is affiliated to West Bengal State University under 2F, 12B of the UGC Act. The college was established on 6th October, 1986. The college was formerly affiliated to the University of Calcutta since its inception in 1986 and then subsequently to the West Bengal State University in 2008. The institution has completed more than 36 years of existence. It has been an institution catering to the needs of stakeholders and providing quality education with pride and success. The college stands for quality and excellence, gender equity and social welfare for the benefit of the larger community. The college has qualified teachers and dedicated staff members who are committed to the achievements of its goals and objectives.

- The College has the scope of further extension in the 2nd campus

- The college also faces the challenge of upgrading its infrastructural facilities amidst financial constraints.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

The curricular aspect, one of the key indicators, is considered pivotal in shaping the knowledge pool as we seek to achieve the goal of excellence in higher education. The curricular aspect of Self Study Report of Vivekananda College represents a well-structured curricula with a detailed account of the curriculum planning and implementation with emphasis on the vision, mission, goals and objectives. The institution has well-structured action plans for effective implementation of the curriculum with the assistance of the members of the teaching faculty.

Being an affiliated college under the WBSU, the college is bound by the prescribed curriculum as stated by the University. However, the introduction of Choice Based Credit System has opened up a new vista to satisfy the quest of the knowledge. To cater to the demand of contemporary times, Post Graduate courses have been introduced in Geography, Education and Bengali along with the existing and new undergraduate courses. The teachers of the college attended the various workshops organized by the affiliating university for new CBCS syllabus. The Principal of the college is the Executive Committee member and also district level mentor, of North 24 parganas under the Higher Education Dept, Govt. of West Bengal. Some teachers of the institution are members of UGBOS of WBSU and Governing bodies of other institutions.

The college has initiated various steps for effective curriculum delivery. The institution ensures that students should have options from a variety of combination of subjects offered to them as envisaged in CBCS curriculum. The institution regularly conducts assessment/evaluation process as per the guidelines of the affiliating university. A host of Add on courses/Value added and Certificate courses along with several skill development courses have been started to enrich the students outside the curriculum. The institution encourages active participation in experimental learning like field work and industry visits so that they can achieve excellence. The college has a well-organized feedback system through which it can obtain feedback which is indispensable for quality enhancement. Suggestions and responses are always invited from the stakeholders so that the issues can be resolved accordingly.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

The process of teaching-learning and evaluation remains the principal objective of any academic institution. Vivekananda College, in its SSR, has incorporated information regarding student enrollment following the reservation policy of the Government and other general rules and regulations. Complete transparency is maintained in the admission process. Emphasis is laid on maintaining a healthy teacher-student and mentor-mentees ratio. The research activities of the teachers are duly encouraged. The faculty members earnestly try to use new learning methods using available technology and resources. The performance of the students in the university examinations over the years has been summarized and presented in the report. At the same time, the institution has introduced continuous internal evaluation, assessment and periodical examinations as per the

guidelines of WBSU. Faculty members of the college are involved in the examination process conducted by the affiliating university through setting of question papers, moderation, invigilation, evaluation and discharge of duties as external examiners for Practical examinations and as Head Examiners. The role of mentors in the holistic development of the students is given utmost importance. The teaching-learning process in the institution has evolved from conventional chalk and talk method to more sophisticated modern mode by incorporating the use of ICT, Smart Boards, virtual classrooms and interactive student centric teaching-learning techniques.

To make the teaching-learning process more effective, preparation of academic calendar, lesson plans, monitoring class attendance, efficient utilization of laboratories and libraries, use of blended mode of education and effective assessment methods have been introduced so that Program outcome, Program specific outcome and Course outcome can be achieved. Identification of advanced and slow learners and qualitative improvement in the teaching-learning process has been initiated by the institution. There is lot of emphasis on development of teaching and learning skill through knowledge in pedagogy and a structured annual academic plan. Besides, the students have been given good exposures to activities like debates, seminars, symposia, workshop, field tour and hands on training. The teaching learning process has been aided by an advanced library network based on latest technology and software.

Research, Innovations and Extension

The institution's teaching activities are further enhanced by the research activities of the teachers. The institution always encourages faculties for carrying out research work. A significant number of teachers have completed Ph.D. during the last few years that is reflected in the Self Study Report. Besides, some faculty members have got themselves registered for pursuing Ph.D. during this period. The institution encourages faculties to publish papers in UGC referred Journals, International Journals, and edited Book volumes. Vivekananda College, in its Self-Study Report, has laid emphasis on various extension activities undertaken within or outside the campus through which awareness on various social issues and community needs have been focused upon. Participation of students in these activities is encouraged. This helps them to empathize with the problems of the society and accordingly expand the horizon of their learning through direct communication with the local community. The NSS wing of the institution organizes blood donation camp, awareness camp about road safety, anti-tobacco awareness programme, dengue and malaria awareness programmes, Health and eye check-up camps, Thalassemia screening test and all other services. The institution also encourages faculty and student exchange with other institutions, field studies/trip for broadening the horizon of the students. The college is signatory to functional MOUs with other institutions in order to cater to the needs of the students. The institution regularly organizes seminars and workshops to encourage the students. The faculties publish their papers in UGC registered Journals and International reputed Journals, edited Books.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

Any academic institution depends on infrastructure and learning resources for dissemination of education and information. This in turn facilitates the all-round growth and development of the institution. The college is well aware of the need for infrastructural services and resources for betterment of teaching-learning, research, office management, upgradation of library and laboratories, financial services and for many other purposes relating to admission, registration, evaluation and student progression.

The college has taken several initiatives for development of infrastructure and for providing better learning

resources. Firstly, the college has purchased more desktops, laptops, printers, scanners for day to day official and academic work during the last five years. These devices are accessible to all the stakeholders as per their needs and requirements. Moreover, the college also uses these facilities for evaluation and assessment work.

The college has procured and installed software for financial accounting, student admission, registration, library work and provided fast internet connection. The college spends its financial resources for maintenance of infrastructures including hardware and software.

The college has provided some classrooms with modern facilities like Smart Board, Projectors, LMS and made arrangements for ICT based academic work. The students can access OPAC, eBooks through Inflibnet-Nlist. The college uses cloud hosted ILMS KOHA software to manage library operations.

The college has a large well equipped seminar hall for conducting seminars and workshops. An open stage has also been newly constructed for staging cultural programmes. The students and other stakeholders can avail the various facilities available in the Gymnasium. Indoor games facilities have also been made available for the students.

Student Support and Progression

The institution provided all kinds of support to the students for their studies and progression. The support includes financial as well as technical assistance. A significant percentage of students have been benefitted by scholarships and free ships provided by the Government as stated in the Self Study Report. The State Government has introduced scholarship for the girl students under the Kanyasree Prakalpa and many girl students of the institution have benefitted from this scheme. Apart from this Vivekananda scholarships and scholarships for minority students are availed by the students.

Capacity building and skill enhancement initiatives have been undertaken by the institution for the benefit of the students. The initiatives include soft skills, language and communication skills, life skills like Yoga, meditation etc. Different programs for development of soft skills, public speaking, group discussion, job-oriented training, interview skills, etc. are regularly conducted by the college. Many students of the college have qualified for UGC NET/ SET and other competitive examinations after passing out from the institution. Some of these students also conduct classes and share their experiences with the present students.

The institution has a transparent mechanism for timely redressal of student grievances. There are Grievance Cell, Anti Ragging Cell, Anti Sexual Harassment Cell, Vishakha committee, Internal Complaint committee to look after these issues. The institution also regularly provides for placement opportunity of its students. The college has introduced Post Graduation courses in Geography, Bengali and Education to help the students to pursue higher education and ensure their progression. Students from our college have also qualified successfully in state and national level examinations. The institution has also organized sports and cultural events on a regular basis over the years. The college has a registered Alumni Association which is contributing in the development of the college in various ways.

Governance, Leadership and Management

The institution has a well-organized governance, leadership and management for academic and administrative purposes. The College has emphasized on administrative competence, accountability, collective responsibility,

leadership and professional management of its affairs. The college has a Governing Body consisting of the President, the secretary/Principal, nominees of the Government and of the Universities and teaching and nonteaching and student representatives. The Governing Body meets on a regular basis and takes important policy decisions related to academic, administrative and financial management by Finance Committee. Besides, the college has an Internal Quality Assurance Cell and Academic Cell for the purpose of providing leadership and expertise in various academic matters. Apart from this, various academic committees also assist in the smooth functioning of the college. The Internal Quality Assurance Cell convenes meetings on a regular basis, formulates and implements quality initiatives and interacts with the Governing Body, different faculties and the office. The Internal Quality Assurance Cell has set the standards of quality enhancement and excellence over the years. The Finance Committee approves and reviews important financial policies and decisions and communicates these to the Governing Body for approval. The Academic Cell meets on a regular basis to review and implement academic policies and interacts with the Internal Quality Assurance Cell for coordination of different programs. The management of the institution works in a democratic manner and emphasis is laid on transparency and accountability of the stakeholders. Principal, as the Head of the institution, has always led from the front and provided able leadership in this respect. The pattern of management is changing in conformity with the changing needs and aspiration of the students. The objective of the Governance, Leadership and Management is to prioritize the major issues and subjects confronting the stakeholders and to devise suitable academic and administrative strategies for better output and achievement.

Institutional Values and Best Practices

Institutional values and best practices are important benchmarks for quality enhancement. The College has given importance to the promotion of core values and ideals among its students like promotion of human values, women empowerment, gender equity, tolerance, harmony and peaceful coexistence. Several programs on gender issues and women empowerment have been organized and some of the fundamental psychological issues of the students have been addressed through psychological counseling by professional counsellors.

The institution has also initiated several measures for energy and water conservation, environmental sustenance, tree plantation and maintenance of green campus. Solar lights have been introduced in the campus. The National Service Scheme Unit has also been fairly active over the years in organizing programs on institutional values, environment protection, social service, and best practices.

The college has given a lot of importance to two major areas of Innovations and Best Practices, namely-Entry in service and Inclusive development in selected villages of Kemia-Khamarparpar gram panchayat under the Unnat Bharat Abhiyaan. A large number of activities have been carried out in promoting these best practices as documented in the SSR. Different facilities like elevator, wheel chair, pedestrian friendly pathways are provided for the differentially abled students. Other facilities like book bank, free medical checkup, financial assistance and support to the needy are provided as and when required. The institution is very active in celebrating and organizing different commemorative days, events and festivals like the Republic Day, Independence Day, World Environment Day, International Women' Day Vivekananda's Birthday, Rabindra Jayanti, Matribhasha Diwas etc. on a regular basis.

Education is one of the most powerful weapons to transform the world. Providing quality and holistic education to all is what the institution strives for. The institution aims to create better citizens, illuminate their minds and empower them for a bright future. These are the hallmarks of this institution.

These initiatives are as follows- • Collaboration of Departments of Chemistry and Physics for use of Laboratory equipments by teachers and students. • Collaboration of Departments of Chemistry and Post-Graduate Department of Geography for Soil Testing, water testing and Soil (ph) measurement. • Collaboration of Department of Computer science and Geography for Soft skill development of students. • Collaboration of Department of Education and Geography for conduction of Excursion, use of ICT and Statistical techniques. • Sharing of Laboratory equipment among different Departments • Sharing of Smart classrooms and Virtual classrooms among various Departments. • Inter-College and Intra-College exchange of faculties within different Departments of the college and other colleges/Universities. • Collaboration of Departments of Philosophy, Political Science and History in the field of Women's empowerment, organization of Youth Parliaments, debates and discussion etc. • Collaboration of Departments of English and Bengali in the field of various Literary activities. • Spoken English classes are arranged by Department of English for the students of all Departments. • Environmental studies is an inherent part of the undergraduate curriculum of students from all the disciplines to facilitate multidisciplinary approach. • Basic Computer skill development for students of all Departments is encouraged by the college in collaboration with Webel technologies. This is aimed to promote computer literacy among all the students. 3. Skill development:	<p>Skill development helps to build up a strong foundation of students. It helps to build up Self-esteem, confidence and leadership skills. It also promotes problem solving skills and collaborative learning. It helps students to become independent thinkers and encourages them to plan for their future. The college has taken various initiatives for development of various skills-both academic and extra-curricular amongst the students. The college has collaborated with Pidilite industries which has helped in promotion of art and crafts skills among the interested students. These skills involved training in Dokra crafts, Mandala art, application of tie and dye techniques, preparation of useful and aesthetic artifacts from recycled waste materials, fabric coloring, different handicrafts etc. The students participated soft skill programmes i.e Python, QGIS, ICT etc. The initiatives taken by the College in this regard has been highly successful as the students have shown keen interest in learning these Soft Skills. The college collaborated with IPE Institute of Professional Excellence for 4 days soft skill training from 2017-2022. The college arranged the Training Programme- Effective Communication for the Non-Teaching Staffs of the college from 2017-2022. The college also organized for Training Programme on Stress Management and Work Life Balance for the teachers of our institution from 2017-2022. Our students successfully participated in training on “Advance Excel” and training on “Digital marketing” Conducted by the above said institution from 2017-2022. Another very innovative initiative taken by the college was to encourage students in the skill of Horse-Riding. The college collaborated with a professional Horse Riding agency. Trained personnel were engaged in providing training to the interested students in learning Horse-Riding. Weekly Yoga and meditation sessions have been organized on a regular basis. The college has collaborated with ‘BramhaKumaris ’ and expert Yoga Trainers regularly visit the college to encourage students in the aspect of Yoga Training. A huge number of students have enrolled for this yoga training. Experts</p>

This has been duly envisioned in the NEP, 2020. Indian knowledge system seeks to promote interdisciplinary research on all aspects of IKS, preserve and disseminate IKS for further research and societal application, actively engage for spreading the rich heritage of our country and traditional knowledge in the field of Arts and Science. These components need to be incorporated in the curriculum in an accurate and scientific manner. Vernacular Language is inextricably linked to art and culture of any region. Art, in the form of literature, plays, music, films etc. cannot be fully appreciated without the local language which is most easily comprehended by the students. So, in order to preserve and promote our culture, we need to promote regional language. Post Graduate & Graduate courses are offered in Vernacular Language. Besides relevant documentaries and movie</p>

shows in regional language are periodically arranged. 'BHASHA DIWAS' is celebrated in the college with great enthusiasm by students and teachers. Students' have also been trained in 'Proof reading in vernacular language' which will boost their literary skills. Bengali Typing is a much needed aspect for the students and the college is taking proper initiatives to enhance students' skills regarding Bengali Typing. Apart from promotion of language, local culture also needs to be preserved. In this context, local festivals and events are also celebrated in the college with great enthusiasm and favor. Bengali festivals that are annually celebrated in the college include RabindraJyanti, NajrulJayanti, BasontoUtsav, Saraswati Puja, Nababorsho, Sarodutsav etc. Various programmes like song and dance recitals, elocution, speeches, drama etc are conducted. We observe various important days viz. Vivekananda's Birthday, Netaji's Birthday, Voters' Day, Republic Day, Teachers Day. Another important initiative by the college in promotion of traditional system of yoga and meditation among the stakeholders. The college has collaborated with 'PrajapitaBramaKumariIshwariyaViswaVidyalaya' for conducting meditation classes. An add-on course in the college on 'Stress Management' using traditional methods of meditation. In this respect the college collaborated with Madhyamgram 'GURUKUL'. Yoga experts from this institute visited the college in order to conduct yoga sessions. 'International Yoga Day' was also celebrated. We observed Azadi Ka Amrut Mahotsav initiated by the Central Govt. of India and many students as well as stakeholders participated in the programmes. Our Cine Club presented various documentary films mainly related to Independence and Transgender, Gender Equality. Documentary movies on Mahatma Gandhi, Ambedkar, Asutosh Mukherjee and Shyama Prasad Mukherjee, Chittaranjan Das, Khudiram Bose, Netaji Subhash Chandra Bose, Partition, Transgender- 'I am Jayita'. We also hosted a PPT presentation session on Gender Equality and Women Empowerment. At the time of Amphan and Yash we distributed reliefs among the poor people of our adopted villages and Sandesh khali.

5. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):

Outcome –based education is an educational theory that bases each part of an educational system around

specific goals. Outcome based education has gained much impetus in the contemporary education system. Student participation is an essential part of OBE. THE students can do their learning and analyze their skills and development. Additionally parents and educational communities can get involved either by way of developing a curriculum or making changes to it. This upholds the standard of education and ensures a students through preparedness for life after. OBE thus aims to assess the competence of learners in their totality. It takes e holistic approach in describing the competence of a learner in terms of knowledge, skills and values. Being an affiliated college of the WBSU, we are bound to follow the university designed curriculum. Still the college has started certain initiatives for outcome based learning for the benefit of students. Programmes are conducted for the Students to equip them with art and crafts skills. Collaboration with Pidilite Industries has been done in this respect. This will help to empower the students in finding out alternate ways of self-employment. Our Chemistry Department had taken initiative to guide the students to make Sanitizers for distributing among the poor people. One of the main aims of outcome based education is to empower the students and ensure their success in the job market. For this purpose, regular work shops are being conducted for equipping students with knowledge regarding the various competitive examinations. Orientation towards job related courses have been conducted by ICICI Academic, Bandhan Skill Development Centre(supported by BANDHANBANK),RICE Institute, GeorgeTelegraph, Pune Institute of Business Management, Gillette P&G, Anudip Foundation, IIT Kanpur etc. Our college has also offered the facility of online career counselling system to the students for getting job in future. The Post-Graduate department of Geography has initiated the development of skills that make the students adapting handling GPS, Geo referencing and preparation of various types of maps. Students also become proficient in techniques of field study. Students of Computer Science and Education Department become expert in various soft skills and ICT tools. The students of English and Bengali develop proficiency in communication skills, proofreading, advertisement and marketing skills. The various add-

1.1.1 The Institution ensures effective curriculum planning and delivery through a well-planned and documented process including Academic calendar and conduct of continuous internal Assessment

Response:

Efficacy of curriculum development ensures listing of topics, sequence of topics, clarity, accuracy and appropriateness of topic presentation. The institution ensures emphasis on topic delivery, completing in proper frequency with depth and pace. The faculty makes sure that the overall structure is integrated, interdisciplinary and focus is on conceptual ideas. Here stress is given on analytic approach, communication and proper reflection.

Here the professional development of the teachers is ensured. Importance is given to class size and preparation allotted per class. There are practices of internal assessment in the institution. Further care is given to the language proficiency of the students. Again, by conducting parent-teacher meeting, parental involvement in the wards' progress is duly considered.

The college prospectus offers information on the evaluation blue-print to the applicants. The News letter offers information regarding various activities of the college before the students.

The college has a detailed academic calendar which is distributed to the students at the commencement of every academic session.

Each Department meets the students in every semester in a session where they discuss on the teaching plans – its design, progress, difficulties in implementation, modification and receive feedbacks from the students.

Every year Departmental teachers meet together along with the administration at least thrice to discuss academic calendar and teaching plan – the modalities, expectations, constraints, strategies to overcome difficulties.

Before the commencement of every semester respective departments prepare a detailed study plan, assignments for the individual teachers and the number of classes allotted to each course. On the basis of this, the Routine Sub-Committee prepares a detailed time-table for the entire semester. Finally this is distributed to the Departmental teachers and the students through Notice Board and website also.

The faculty helps the students to find the relevance in learning. The institution ensures that the students demonstrate the talent by conducting debate, extempore. Stress is on developing new skills to enable the students to achieve success.

Here the practice is to ensure that students are the units in the learning development process. The faculty helps the students to identify critical topics for review, develop questions, planned enquiry and they share the learning process and content. The faculty oversees the connectivity and interaction among students

through processes to organize the skill of learning. Our students are able to tackle multi-levels of activity and challenges. In case of Post Graduate Departments (M.Sc in Geogaphy, M.A in Bengali and M.A in Education) the time table shows both under graduate and post graduate classes effectively. The curriculum for Under Graduate and Post Graduate courses is accordingly distributed among the faculty members and lesson plan is submitted herewith.

Professional Ethics:

The college is affiliated to the West Bengal State University and hence has to follow the syllabus/ Curriculum as laid down by the parent University. However, in each subject, wherever possible, classroom teaching integrates major social issues like gender, professional ethics, human values, environmental issues etc. in various ways within the parameters of the syllabus. Through student participation in seminars/webinars, Poster Competitions, Documentary film, these issues are addressed. This can be illustrated with reference to some activities undertaken by some of the Departments.

Gender

Although the college is meant only for boys but different programmes are undertaken to introduce the young minds with different cross cutting implications on Gender Issues.

Syllabi of different programmes, as much as feasible, incorporate topics in such a way that Gender Issues automatically become included in different class room discussions.

Seminars and workshops are organized to sensitize students to this area. Teachers also counsel the students in the college campus. Cultural and Extension activities are also set in such a way that the students are required to review the issues on their own.

Human value:

The Political Science Department and Cine Club presented a documentary film on Transgender that is “I am Joyita” for grew up the awareness among the students about Transgender on holistic attitude. This type of awareness is very much needed of our society.

Environment and Sustainability:

Political Science, Geography, Education and History Departments presented wall magazines, wherein students are encouraged to do research on a given environmental issue (health & hygiene, biodiversity conservation etc.) and make posters on these issues. Through class presentations also awareness on various environmental issues is being taken up. Through Environment Studies Project work the students gain practical knowledge on the environment and issues related to the environment. In United Board sponsored projects students have been involved in assessing floral and faunal diversity in the campus and environmental audit, water quality assessment in the campus. The Geography Department, NSS and IQAC organized plantation programme in regular basis. The NSS and IQAC organized Seminars on Environmental issues in regular basis to grow up the essence regarding environment and how to save the earth properly by future generation.

The Annual Retreat every year focusses on major moral/ social issues related to life. These occasions are a way of helping the student grapple with complex issues of existence and inculcate strong values that help them in later adult life.

2.3 Teaching- Learning Process

2.3.1 Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences using ICT tools

Response:

1. Teaching faculty of the College promotes and exhibits experimental learning method. The main objective of this method is to indulge and develop experimental learning approach amongst the students. The teacher plays the role of a facilitator ensuring that a student has access to all learning material that will help ingraining knowledge through experience.
2. Specially, departments like Physics, Chemistry and Geography use this method in the teaching-learning process to facilitate learning abilities of students. The instructor guides rather than directs the learning process where students are naturally interested in learning.
3. Reflecting and innovation teaching methodologies are employed. Almost all faculty members make extensive use of ICT in the class room.
4. Emphasis is given on skill development. For this, a skill Development Centre has been set up within the institute to provide adequate training in soft skill, language and communication skills, skills and awareness on the technology through various programmes.
5. Students also conduct workshop in the filled in which they have gathered more experience and knowledge. They also take part in organizing various extra and co-curricular events which help them in developing their Organizational skills. Special programs on Women's Day, Republic Day and World Environment Day are also conducted by them.
6. Intern ships are regularly offered to both UG and PG students.
7. Students undergo educational tours from different subjects like Geography Benaras(2019), Bolpur(2019), Lingthan(2022), Education Benaras(2019) , Bolpur(2019), English Jorasanko(2018-2019), Bengali Bolpur, Santiniketan, Jorasanko(2018-2019) and History Chandraketurah, Gandhighat and Indian Museum(2018-2019). They are guided during pursuing their tours and helped them to expand their thinking abilities

8. Students of Geography Department pursued visit to cottage industry, Small scale industries, solar panel and water treatment plants. These visits added a beneficial horizon in the thought process of the student's vision.
9. Students also conducted E-Quiz, debates, discussions and related other activities. These help them to nurture their thinking process, enhance their cognitive ability, reflected their judgement procedure.

Participative Learning:

1. Students are given certain specific topics which are of sheer importance both practically and academically. Then, they are divided into various groups and asked to read various articles and /or summaries, further to analyses and reflect on it.
2. Students are activated using a combination of various participative methods such as brainstorming, case studies role playing, and so on. It helps them in reflective thinking, problem solving and to logically question what was taught.
3. This method provide feedback and evaluation of activities.

Problem - Solving Methodologies

1. Students are encouraged to find multiple solutions to problem and are given time to solve problems. The College thus adopts student centric learning method. Besides classroom teaching and laboratory experiment based learning, students are also involved in various innovative projects. The projects in turn, help towards enhancing the real life problem solving abilities of the students.
2. Students are guided during the searching and solving process. They carry out tasks like mind mapping on specific topics, which helps them to expand their thinking potentialities.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 Mechanism of internal/ external assessment is transparent and the grievance redressal system is time- bound and efficient

Response:

Internal assessment is an important part of the continuous evaluation process. It helps to reduce the burden and tension of the students related to the final examination. It also helps the students in better preparation for their end-semester examination. The college has initiated continuous internal evaluation in accordance with the norms and guidelines as stated by West Bengal State University. Every effort is made on the part of the college to conduct the internal examinations with the utmost level of transparency.

- The Institution informs the students and parents about the schedule of the Internal and External examinations in the beginning of the academic year. The students are also informed about the detailed schedule of the internal examination through notification in the website well in advance.**

- The examination and assessments are carried out in accordance with the set academic timetable. The answer scripts of internal assessments are shown to the students.
- Availability of previous years' external and internal question papers-both theory and practical is ensured in the library for the ready reference of students.
- The internal papers are evaluated within a week of the day of exam and the marks are communicated to the students in the classroom. The teachers also make an effort to clear the doubt of the students regarding the question paper. Students are also advised regarding the various ways in which they can improve their performance.
- Furthermore, the marks and the performance of the students are conveyed to the parents in the parents-teachers meet and also via messages and emails.
- Online MCQ tests are also conducted as a method of internal assessment, and the results are declared to understand the learning level of students. This helps the students to prepare for competitive examination in future as well.
- The internal examination committee monitors and conducts internal examinations in the college with active participation of all teaching faculties and non-teaching staff.
- All the teachers of the concerned departments submit a set of question papers through the Head of the Department to the examination committee well in advance of the commencement of the exam.
- After the results are announced student can seek a revaluation of their answer sheets if needed. This will help in the clarification of their doubts.
- Photocopy of the answer sheets is made available to the students if they seek clarification.
- The answer sheets are preserved and documented for further clarification and use.
- For maintaining the transparency and effectiveness of the continuous internal evaluation process, the college examination committee takes the responsibility and monitors the mechanism throughout the year.

1. The programme outcome (PO), programme specific outcome (PSO) and course outcome (CO) of all programmes and courses are made available in the College website. Besides, the institution has a separate PO-CO Mapping and Attainment portal. Further, the syllabi of all of the programmes are made available online (college website), offline (departments) and students' what's app group in the beginning of the academic session.

1. The Programme outcomes (PO) and Course outcomes (CO) are also available in the institutional LMS.

2. The outcomes are communicated to the faculty-members by the IQAC and the departmental heads. The faculties actively participate in formulation and review of the outcomes.

1. The framework of the Programme Outcomes (PO) and Course Outcomes (CO) designed by the faculty are discussed in the departmental meetings and new faculty members are also acquainted. After discussion, validation and approval it is submitted to the Academic Committee and finally uploaded to the Institutional website.

1. The programme outcomes (PO), programme specific outcomes (POS) and course outcomes (CO) are reviewed from time to time and accordingly modified.

1. Programme Outcomes and Course Outcomes are discussed with the parents and their wards at the time of admission. Besides, students are briefed about POs and COs in the introductory classes.

The Institution has a well-defined mechanism, using an online software to track and monitor the attainment levels for program outcome, course outcome and program specific outcome.

The direct method operates in the following way:

- The set program outcomes, course outcomes, and program specific outcomes are collected for different courses and targets are set.
- Calculations are done for the attainment of the course outcomes to program outcomes.

- Each CO is mapped to PO to make a (CO-PO) matrix.
- The result and performance data of every student is uploaded to the software which automatically calculates the attainment levels of PO, CO and PSO's.

The IQAC regularly monitors the attainment level for every course. In case, the attainment level of any course is below the threshold level, additional measures such as remedial classes, tutorial classes etc. are conducted. The evaluation of attainment is primarily made on the basis of the performances of the students in summative and formative assessments. The summative assessment is made through the semester examination of the affiliating university, and counts for 80% of the assessment. The other 20% of weightage for internal assessment is used not only for the formative assessment of the student, but also for assessment of the course outcome.

Learning outcomes of the students are regularly monitored by the departments and appropriate remedial measures are taken for desired course outcomes.

3.4 Extension Activities

3.4.1 Extension activities are carried out in the neighborhood community, sensitizing students to social issues, for their holistic development, and impact thereof during the last five years.

Response:

The institution has regularly and successfully carried out various extension activities in the neighbourhood community . by sensitizing students to different social and environmental problems . The college has identified itself with the community and motivating the stakeholders to get involved in social work. This helps in fostering their holistic development and at the same time benefits the community. The stakeholders of the institution are actively involved in getting the students motivated to do some community development work for the resolution of different social and environmental issues. Food items, medicines, masks and sanitisers were distributed among the villagers during the two devastating cyclones- YASH and AMPHAN. The Institution has adequate infrastructure and physical facilities for teaching- learning. viz., classrooms, laboratories, computing equipment etc.

Vivekananda College sprawls over an area of 1.81 acres including the area of second campus which provides ample framework for carrying out learning process, career progression and advanced education. The institution caters to the needs of about 3937 students (2021-22). We have one Principal's room, 6 teachers' rooms, one office room , one accounts room, one IQAC room, NSS room, 3 Smart class rooms , one seminar hall, one central library room, 6 departmental libraries, one ladies' common room, one boys' common room, one Unnat Bharat Abhiyaan room, one Cafeteria, one night guard room, 3 store rooms, one reading room, one open stage ,gymnasium room and one dark room. Besides, there are 17 latrines and Bathrooms, 32 CCTVs, 24 ACs, 8 solar lights, 2 xerox machines, 3 hanging projectors, one portable projector and 12 printers. We also have one virtual class room. We have 6 laboratories viz. i) Geography , ii) Education , iii) Computer science , iv) Chemistry v) Physics and vi) Journalism and Mass Communication. The Department of Geography has a well equipped Remote Sensing and GIS laboratory. We have one Digitalized library which houses 13,390 barcoded books, inflibnet systems in which 1 lakh e-books & 6000 e- journals, Opec systems & e-catalogues systems. We have One play ground & some indoor sports facilities. We have 57computers & 40 Class rooms (including laboratories) for the students and all stakeholders.

Vivekananda College has wholeheartedly attempted to comply with all the imperative standards expected of the affiliating college as far as infrastructural framework, provision of learning material, ICT devices etc are concerned. Every one of the departments are furnished with sufficient study halls, research facilities, Log Book, Activity Record Book, Attendance Register, blackboards, white board, white chalks, coloured chalks, duster and so on. College faculties are permitted to utilize advanced study hall, meeting room, computers and internet facilities as and when required. The open stage is used for Meditation sessions. Besides the students and teachers also benefit from the use of gymnasium. Aside from Central library, some of the departments, specifically the post-graduate departments, maintain their own departmental library for UG and PG students. The college campus is secured with Wi-Fi Internet facilities to be utilized by instructors, students and other stakeholders for scholastic and regulatory purposes.

Vivekananda College Central Library has started alongwith the establishment of the college in 1986 to cater to the academic needs of the faculty, students and staffs. The library has started automation using Integrated Library Management System (ILMS) since 2015. The KOHA software has been installed in the college library for automation and presently use version: 21.11.03.000. KOHA is a full – featured open source Library Management software on Ubuntu 14.04 platform. It is customized web – based Inter face with full MARC Support (MARC 21 and UNIMARC) and include Z 39.50 server and client for data interchange. The library is partly automated and try to implement different module of KOHA. After the books procurement by the library the “Cataloguing” module of KOHA is used to process them and generate the searchable bibliographic record for proper utilization of the resource. Barcode have been generated for books after entering them in KOHA Library Management System. Each book entered into the system has barcode pasted on the front side of the book. The” Reports” module of KOHA is being used to gain general and specific data regarding library services.

The college library is a member of NLIST program of the UGC – INFLIBNET centre for the purpose of accessing the electronic resource like SodhGanga and SodhSindhu. Through this program we have the access to more than 6000 full text electronic journals and more than 3,00,000 full text electronic books. Central library of college has Online Public Access Catalogue (OPAC) which is accessible to the teachers, students and alumnus through internet.

Besides the books of different UG and PG courses, the College library has a good collection of journals, reference books, books written by eminent personalities, book bank and books contributed by alumnus. Inter – library loan procured among central library and departmental as well as seminar library.

The library provide remote access to the digital resource such as previous years question papers, list of newly arrived books etc. to its users.

6.2 Strategy Development and Deployment

The college has initiated various programmes and strategies to open up new vistas of knowledge for the students in order to strive for excellence. For this purpose various skill development programmes and add-on courses have been introduced for the undergraduate and post graduate students which have been received with wholehearted participation from the students across all streams.

Certificate programme on Stress management and Meditation was organized in collaboration with Prajapita Brahma Kumari Institute. Art and Craft Workshop was conducted in collaboration with Pidilite Industries limited. Besides, MOU has been initiated with several institutes and colleges to facilitate faculty and students exchange. 6.3 Faculty Empowerment Strategies

Our institution is committed to provide effective welfare measures for its own human resources, its teaching and non-teaching staff. The college authority always strives to meet the requirements of its teaching and non-teaching staff as recognition of their commitment and dedication to service. The following welfare measures have been initiated in this regard-

- General Provident Fund for all the teaching and non-teaching staff is ensured through Government Treasury as per Government rules. Pension benefits is well streamlined and efforts are made to disburse pension and gratuity benefits to the retired employee at the earliest.
- All types of leave are allowed as per the University Statute and Government regulations. It includes maternity leave and Child care leave too. Leave accounts are maintained properly so that no staff member faces any difficulty at any point of time during and after the service period.
- All permanent employees are allowed to draw medical allowances as per the state government guidelines. Besides, Government salaried staff are encouraged to join Government Health schemes- West Bengal Health Scheme .
- The institution is very supportive to ensure that all it faculty members as well as non-teaching staff meet the required criteria for career advancement (promotion).
- The institution facilitates leave to faculty members as permissible under the Government norms to complete Ph.D.
- The institution allows duty leave for faculty members to attend various courses stipulated by the University Grants Commission like Refresher Course, Orientation Programmes, Faculty

Development Programmes and Short term courses.

- Faculty members are encouraged to attend international, national as well as local seminars of importance as resource person and as paper presenters. Duty leave is allotted accordingly.
- The institute also encourages faculty members to apply for Major and Minor Research Projects under various Central / state Government schemes.
- Festival advance is given to Non-teaching employees before Durga Puja which is recovered in the subsequent ten months.

Based on the accounts and records submitted by the college office, Mr. Parimal Moulik, Partner of the above-mentioned company (Membership No. 059926), on behalf of the firm, conducts the internal audits and hands over the reports to the Principal of the college. The audit reports are prepared annually. After an in-depth study and analysis of the report, the Governing Body instructs the concerned section to rectify the errors, if any, to set right the audit objections.

The **External Auditor** are appointed by Directorate of Public Instructor as per the Government norms and rules. The objections mentioned in the report are communicated to the concerned sections for immediate rectifications.

The college authority has completed statutory audit by the Higher Education Department for the financial year 2017-18 and 2018-2019. The Higher Education Department has not yet sent any auditor's name to do audit for the financial year 2019-20, 2020-21 and 2021-22. In this regard the statutory audit has not yet been completed. Under these circumstances, we have completed the Internal Auditor' report for the financial years 2019-2020, 2020-21 and 2021-22. Further, we have submitted the institutional return to the Income-tax Office for the financial years 2017-18, 2018-19, 2019-20, 2021-21 and 2021-2022.

Besides, a Legal Awareness Camp for women was organized by National Legal Service Authority and State Legal Services Authority, West Bengal in collaboration with IQAC and NSS unit, Vivekananda College. This was aimed at raising legal awareness level among the students, especially girl students. This has helped them to gain knowledge about the legal provisions available in the Indian Penal Code which may be of immense help in dealing with future problems. Another state level seminar was organized by the Research Coordination Committee, Vishakha committee and IQAC on Gender Sensitization and Prevention of Sexual Harassment at Work Place. 1. Initially students did not take interest in the system of entry-in-service.

BEST PRACTICE 02:

Title: 'Inclusive Development in selected Villages of Kemia-Khamarpara Gram Panchayet'

1. Objectives of the Practice:

The main objective of the practice is to carry out inclusive development activities among the poor villages of the selected villages under Kemia-Khamarpara Gram Panchayet. Although the villages are located in close proximity to urban areas but still they are lagging behind in various facilities like educational attainment, sanitation, roads etc. The primary objective is to raise the awareness level among the villagers regarding education medical facilities, sanitation and cleanliness etc. Enhancing the awareness level will help the villagers in addressing these issues and will also ensure participatory community development.

(2)The Context:

The adopted villages are located in the vicinity of urban areas although they have a distinct rural character the condition of roads, educational facilities, sanitation, drinking water etc. are lagging behind medical facilities are not up to the mark. Most of the villagers do not have access to the facilities of Higher Education. Agriculture and fishing are the dominant occupational practice of the villagers. Under these

circumstances it was a challenge to involve the villagers in the developmental initiatives undertaken by the institution. Regular visits to the villages by students, teaching and non-teaching staff has helped in building the rapport with the villagers and in gaining their confidence.

(3)The Practice:

The College has adopted five villages – Kaipul, Krishnapur-Madanpur, Khamarpara, Bagbanda- Saiberia & Kirtipur located at a distance of about 12 (twelve) KMs from the College in the year 2017- 2018 under the Unnat Bharat Abhiyan. The villagers fall under the jurisdiction of Kemia-hamarpara Gram Panchayat. Various community development activities are carried out in these villages for the benefit of the inhabitants. In order to generate the awareness regarding importance of education among the primary students, distribution of copies, colour pencils, Mask & Sanitizer and other stationary items is done by the College periodically. During the pandemic period, programmes were organized to distribute sanitizer and masks among the village inhabitants.

(4)Evidence of Success:

The Programme has achieved several successful milestones. Many of the un-metalled roads have been transformed to metal roads. Clean and safe drinking water supply has also been ensured in a significant number of houses. Besides the soil testing reports and water testing reports has been shared with the Panchayet authorities which has proved beneficial for the farming community. Apart from this the knowledge regarding land sustainability for crops has also been shared with the farmers which will prove beneficial for them in diversifying their cropping patters. The primary school students have shown great enthusiasm while participating in the college initiatives. The College authorities have been successful in promoting awareness regarding education among them and most of the children seem pursue Higher Education. Street lights have also been provided in some of the villages. The College has also collaborated with the Panchayet and B.D.O. implementation of PMAY which has helped in building of several pacca house in the villages. Some local clubs have also been modernized.

(5)Problems encountered and resources required:

Some problems have been encountered during the implementation of various programmes. The dominant problem has been to manage ample time required to carry out these extensive activities amidst the hectic schedule of the college. Besides the distance of the villages has also proven to be a hindrance as transportation facilities need to be arranged for going to the villages. Besides ensuring involvement of all the villagers as part of inclusive participatory approach has also proven to be a difficulty as villagers are often engaged in farming and fishing throughout the day.

The financial resources required for carrying out these extensive programme has been a major problems. The College has received financial assistance of Rs.50,000/- (Fifty thousand) only as part of the “UNNAT BHARAT ABHIYAAN”. These amount is too meagre as compare to our requirement. The rest of the resources have managed from the college fund.

Response:

7.3.1 Institutional Distinctiveness (Promotion of Extension Activities)

The Institution caters to the requirements of both Post Graduate and Under Graduate courses with its focus on igniting young minds and fostering their holistic development. This is reflected in the Mission and Vision of the college. The college endeavors to promote an inclusive educational system which will prioritize the needs and interests of the stakeholders specially those belonging to the weaker sections of the society and make them better citizens. At the same time, the college is committed to fulfill its duties towards the society at large. The institution wishes the stakeholders to be socially responsible, participatory and committed in providing service to the people as education is not an end in itself, but a means to accomplish certain noble objectives and transmit fundamental values. Since its inception, the institution has come a long way in providing quality education to a diverse variety of students, many of them being first generation learners and a significant portion belonging to minority community and other weaker sections. In order to promote holistic development of its students, the college has taken several initiatives for various extension activities including community development programs. This can be identified as one of the most distinctive features of our institution. The extension activities are aimed at fostering empathy among the students and make them aware of their duties towards the society as responsible citizens.

Under the Unnat Bharat Abhiyan (UBA), the institution has adopted five villages under Kemia Khamarpara Gram Panchayaat and plans to transform these villages into model villages. Under the able guidance of college authority and with active participation of NSS unit and Alumni association, a host of community development activities are being carried out in these villages. The teaching and non-teaching staff of the college along with the students enthusiastically participate in these initiatives. The institution periodically arranges for distribution of stationaries, copies and other food items among the village primary school children to encourage and help them. During the pandemic period, hand sanitizers prepared in the Chemistry laboratory of the college was distributed among the village women and children. Besides awareness campaign regarding the pandemic was also carried out in the villages. Frequent field visits by students accompanied by the teachers have also been conducted in these villages to assess the soil and water quality. The test reports have been shared with the panchayat authorities so that appropriate steps can be taken for the betterment of farmers.

The institution recognizes its crucial role of empathy and leadership during natural calamities and

disasters. Relief distribution was carried out before Aphan among the villagers of five adopted villages under Unnat Bharat Abhiyan for hundred needy families during the pandemic period. Food items, medicines, masks and sanitisers were distributed among the villagers at Sandeshkali during the two devastating cyclones- Yash and Amphan. The alumni association of the college also wholeheartedly participates and contributes in these community development initiatives and extension services.

Apart from community development work in the adopted villages, the college has taken several initiatives for extension work in the vicinity with the able assistance of the NSS Unit. Awareness campaigns and rallies are regularly carried out in the neighborhood on socially and environmentally relevant issues. The NSS unit has done a lot of work including conduction of Health check-up camp, Eye check-up camp, Thalassaemia detection camp, Blood donation camp, Anti-tobacco awareness programme, Awareness programme on Tuberculosis, vaccination camps for Covid-19, MR Vaccination camps etc. Seminar and Workshops on various social issues like gender equality, women empowerment have also been conducted periodically for raising the awareness level among the stakeholders. The students have also actively participated in rallies on socially relevant issues like 'Safe Drive Safe Live', 'Anti-Plastic campaign', 'Promotion of Bicycle as means of transport', 'Dengue prevention' etc. Besides, campaign has been carried out in the nearby localities to empower women and make them independent in carrying out Net banking services. The NSS volunteers are also engaged in maintaining the greenery and cleanliness of the campus and surrounding areas for a more sustainable environment. Tree plantation Programmes in the campus and five adopted villages by the college authority and Alumni Association have also been carried out as part of environmental awareness.

The institution has achieved various laurels in recognition to our distinctiveness in carrying out various community development programmes as part of extension activities. ARIIA (Atal Ranking of Institutions on Innovation achievements) has recognized our institution as brand performer under the category 'General' on 29/12.2021. SWACHHA Bharat pledge certificate has been awarded by Govt. of India on 1/4/2022. Besides, Mahatma Gandhi National Council of Rural Education, Dept. of Higher Education, Ministry of Education, Govt. of India has certified our institution as 'Recognised Social entrepreneurship, Swachhta and Rural Engagement Cell' Institution on 1/9/2020. The Ministry of Education has awarded a certificate for establishment of Institution's Innovation Council in the campus as per the norms of Innovation cell, Ministry of Education on 1/8/2022.

In spite of financial constraints, the institution wishes to carry out these distinct activities in the future as well with the overwhelming participation of its stakeholders. The institution has been highly successful in sensitizing its students regarding the crucial role they can play in dealing with different social and environmental problems. The community service and social work has not only benefitted the target group immensely but also contributed towards environmental sustainability.

5. CONCLUSION

Additional Information :

We have purchased a land with an areal extent of 1 acre from Kirtipur Nabin Chandra High School for the purpose of constructing the second campus at Kirtripur, North 24 Parganas. The second campus is located at a distance of 7 km from our main campus. Already the construction of boundary wall of the second campus has been completed with financial assistance from the Higher Education Department, Govt. of West Bengal. The plan and estimates have already been prepared and it is also approved by the competent authority. The college Governing body has resolved to sanction a financial assistance of Rs 50 lakhs in the initial phase to construct the Foundation of the new building. However, RUSA has not yet provided any financial assistance in this regard. Although RUSA sanctioned the financial assistance in its meeting, but due to scarcity of funds they have not yet send the money. After the completion of the second campus, newer avenues will open up for the rural people residing in the neighborhood areas. 12 higher secondary schools are located in the surrounding areas with many students being first generation learners and majority belonging to minority community. These students will be able to avail the facilities of higher education as no degree college is located in the vicinity.

Concluding Remarks :

Amidst various adversities, the college is committed to stride ahead in its endeavor to achieve academic excellence. The management is providing all round support towards developing the institution into a centre for advanced teaching and learning. The primary focus is on modernizing the Teaching-learning process with thrust on adoption of ICT and other modern mechanisms to empower the students and make them better prepared to face the challenges of the contemporary world. The institution aims to introduce new skill oriented subjects and more post-graduate departments in order to cater to the needs of the students. The institution is aware of its responsibilities towards the stakeholders especially those who are lagging behind along with those belonging to the economically backward and weaker sections. Special attention is given for the up gradation of these sections. The College is committed to various extension activities including social and other community development works for the benefit of larger community through NSS and other units. The college also carries out a host of community development work not only in the neighborhood but also in the adopted villages (Unnat Bharat Abhiyaan) as part of its social responsibility. The college regularly organizes job-orientation programmes for opening new vistas in job market for the students. Some of these best practices over the years like 'community development work in adopted villages' and 'entry in service' is becoming a regular practice carried out by the institution. Students are encouraged to participate in various cultural and sports activities as part of extra-curricular activities. Regular counseling sessions and add-on courses are organized for the students. The institution is trying various avenues to mobilize additional financial resources for carrying out future plans. The institution has installed solar lights as part of promotion of non-conventional energy. Efforts are being made for sustainable waste management and conservation of water resources through rainwater harvesting as part of sustainable green initiatives.
